

Remarks On Board of the Bark

Saturday January 20th 1849

First Part of these 24 hours fresh gales from NE Squally under Double reefs Course N.W. Middle More moderate turned one reef out the topsails & set top galsails later more moderate all reefs out #12 Middle Stared N.W. #8. At 6 PM. A Bark to Eastward Staring N.W. #12. A Brig off her beam Staring to South Lat Obs 31° 00 Long At Merid 69° 40

Sunday 21st

First Part lively breezes from ENE to East Squally & unsteady Middle from SE to S.E. & Moderate later Strong breezes & fresh gails from S.W. #10 took in all Studding sails set Down Royal yard top Galin Stud Booms also set in fly jibboom Ends with fresh gails thick & rainy Stared N.W. till 8. At 8 AM. North

Lat Account 33° 00 Long 71° 10

Monday 22nd

Commences with Strong gales from SW thick & rainy Course North #2 PM. the wind shifted to N.W. & broke away Single reef the topsails Middle Squally wild & gusty weather wind unsteady halled to Northward #6 AM. tacked to N.W. #8 cleared up ends with fresh breezes from North to N.W. watch End in leaving the try works overboard Water 66°

Lat Obs 34° 14 Long Merid 71° 30

Tuesday 23rd

All these 24 hours unsteady & baffling breezes from N.E. to N.W. first & Middle Strong & Squally with heavy & dense Clouds from the Northward Under Double reefs later moderate all sail out Ships head N.E. Water 66° Air 55 Lat Obs 34° 35 Long Merid 71° 00

Wednesday 24th

All these 24 hours Moderate baffling winds from N.W. to North Middle Squally Stared to Northward by the wind Lat Obs 35° 25 Long Merid 69° 57 Water 67° Air 55

Thursday 25th

First Part Small breezes from the Northward #5 PM. spoke British Barke Thames Deps. 14 Days from Liverpool for New York with 324 Emigrants Short of Provisions & Water She had Bre up for Bermuda I supplied him with 1509 lbs of Bread but could not spare water She proceeded on her passage for N.Y. port Middle Calm later light breeze from SW clear & fine Course N.W. with all sail set Lat 35° 48 Long 70° 08

Roascoe from St Helena towards New Bedford

Friday 26th of January 1848 (1849)

Commences with Moderate breezes from SW fine weather Stared N.W. Middle fresh gails from S.W. flying Clouds & some heavy At 11 took in top Galin Studding sails fresh gails during the night #6 some Squally with rain took in top galsails #10 At 10 the wind increased to a Strong gail Double reef the topsails & reef the mainsail Ends the same heavy & overcast #10 Stared N.W. Note #10 PM. Entered the Stream Lat Obs 38° 27 Long Merid 71° 50 #12 Water 71° Air 63° } At 10 AM. went out of the Stream #5 AM. 69° } Water 65° Air 64 #7.30 AM. 74 Air 64

Saturday 27th

Commences with Strong gails from SW under Double reefs #4 more moderate set top galsails over Single reef topsails #7 the wind halled to N.W. #8 took in top galsails Stared N.W. till 7 then by the wind Strong breezes during the night from N.W. to N.W. under Single & Double reefs by the wind to N.E. Ends more moderate all sail set Air 33° Lat Obs 40° 06 Long At Merid 71° 10

Sunday 28th

First Part fresh breezes from N.W. fine weather by the wind to N.E. Middle mostly moderate but flowy by baffling Ships head from N.E. to ENE & Calde A Considerable Ice made on deck & about the bows later Small breeze from N.E. #7 tacked to N.W. Ends about Calm Lat Obs 40° 39 Long Merid 70° 00 2 sail in light to Eastward
