

Ship Governor of Baltimore 1852
Tuesday January the 11

These 24 hours came with a light breeze from the Eastward and hazy weather. Ship under all top sails on the wind to the South all hands employed in hoisting and coupling down fore ships in sight at 6 PM spoke the Thomas Tucker son of Sag Harbor with 1500 of oil at 10 PM took in gill and began to haul up the Eastward again. Night hoisting and began stowing. Later part light breeze to Eades.

No obs this day

Wednesday Jan the 12

These 24 hours commenced with a light breeze from the Eastward. Ship under all top sails on the wind to the South at 3 PM finished stowing down set the main sail and main top sail at 4 PM. Shorten sail for the night at 8 AM. Haul sail and took in gill and began stowing down at 9 AM finished and took the ship. While at stowing took in gill and later part light breeze and hazy to Eades.

Lat by obs 45 00 S
Long by obs 74 40 E

Thursday Jan the 13

These 24 hours came with a light breeze from the E & E was hazy weather. Ship under all sail by the wind to SE at 7 PM shortened sail for the night. Middle part Irish breeze from the N & W at 4 AM set double reef top sails at 6 AM wind increasing took in sail at 10 AM split the main top sail and up the Starboard Mast.

Friday Jan the 14

These 24 hours came with a heavy gale from the N & W and equally with heavy showers of rain. Ship lying in under three spinnies heading to the South. Ship was brought to by gale in light Middle part heavy gale. Lat by obs 45 30 S More moderate later part equally to Eades.

Saturday Jan the 15

These 24 hours came with Irish gales from the N & W and equally at one PM set the fore sail and head of East at 5 PM took in the 4 sail and haul down set the spinnies head South at 7 PM set the fore spinnies. Stay sail Middle part Irish gale from the N & W at 6 AM were ship to the South. No obs this day one sail in sight later part heavy gale and thick weather to Eades.

Sunday Jan the 16

These 24 hours came with a heavy gale from the N & W and equally ship lying under three spinnies heading to the South at 7 PM were ship to the South. Middle part Irish gales at 7 AM set the main top sail close reefed and set the fore sail and haul of East at 9 AM took in the fore sail and haul down again head N & W saw ashore standing to the South. Later part heavy gale from the westward. Lat by obs 45 47 S and thick hazy weather to Eades. Then Long by obs 75 24 hours.
