 Saturday March the 11 These 24 hours came with a
 light breeze from the South
 and hazy weather ship under
 all sail at 2 P.M. saw whale
 leaved two boat struck and
 starboard boat side at 5 P.M.
 struck the whale to the ship
 and began cutting at 2 P.M.
 finished cutting at the neck
 boiling middle part thick
 weather at 9 P.M. set double
 Latitude 45° 20' N. Reef topsails later part Irish
 Long in 177° 08' E. Breeze so ends

Sunday March the 12 These 24 hours came with a
 Irish breeze from the S.W. and
 and fair weather all the work
 employed on boiling two ship
 in sight at 7 P.M. took in
 sail steady S.W. at 10 P.M.
 wore in to the wind at 5 A.M.
 main sail at 6 A.M. saw whale
 leaved two boats west boat
 struck starboard boat side
 at 10 A.M. took the whale
 to the ship and began cutting
 later part Irish gale from the
 Long in 177° 50' E. so ends

Monday March the 13 These 24 hours came with a
 heavy gale from the S.W. all
 hands employed on cutting
 at 2 P.M. finished cutting and
 began boiling middle part
 Long in 177° 24' E. heavy gale later part the same S.W.

of New Zealand Clark Estes in
 Tuesday. These 24 hours came with
 March 14 Irish gale from the S.W.
 and fair weather all the
 work employed on boiling
 at one P.M. set double reef
 topsails head to the S.W.
 middle part Irish gale at one
 P.M. took in the fore and main
 topsails at 7 A.M. finished boil
 Long in 177° 50' E. later part Irish gale so ends

Wednesday March the 15 These 24 hours came with a fresh
 breeze from the S.W. and
 hazy weather ship under all
 sail. No duty. Steering to the
 S.W. work employed on
 ship's duty at 7 P.M. shortened
 sail for the night. Middle
 part light breeze at 5 A.M. made
 sail and began stowing down
 No duty this day at 11 A.M. finished stowing down
 later part light breeze so ends

Thursday March 16 These 24 hours came with a light
 breeze from the S.W. and
 hazy weather ship under
 all sail by the wind to the
 South work employed on ship's
 duty at 7 P.M. shortened sail
 for the night at 8 P.M. calm
 at 12 midnight Irish gale
 Long in 177° 45' E. from the North in the fore sail
 Long in 177° 06' E. later part heavy gale so ends
