Ship St George in Behring Straits June 1867  
Saturday June 8.

Begins with light breeze and fine weather at S.W. employed cutting finished at 5 P.M. saw whales low and struck one got him to the ship at 9.30 P.M. Latter foggy employed cutting finished at 10 A.M. and started the work.  
No Observation.

Sunday June 9

First part light breeze and thick fog at S. employed boiling and breaking out shucks. Latter part foggy employed setting up shucks spoke the ship Reindeer of New Bedford.  
No Observation.

Monday June 10

Begins with light breeze and foggy employed boiling spoke the bark John Carver. Latter part fresh breeze and a little fog spoke the bark Eagle of Honolulu gave her letters and a box. Ten ships in sight south head of St Lawrence bearing N 8 miles distant saw a large body of ice in the day.  
No Observation.

Tuesday June 11

First part strong breeze and foggy at S.E. saw whales low and three boats but did not get any employed boiling and stowing up cask. Latter part light breeze and thick fog at S. employed stowing down and boiling.

Ship St George in Behring Straits June 1867.  
Wednesday June 12.

Begins with strong breeze and thick fog at S. employed boiling and stowing down. Latter part light breeze and foggy ship laying too under short sail.

Thursday June 13

Begins with strong breeze and foggy at S.E. at 1 P.M. the fog cleared away saw East Cape bearing NW at 10 miles dist. ship under short sail steering NW by N. at 3 P.M. saw whales low and three boats but it shut in thick fog. The boats came aboard middle part laying too. off East Cape latter part light breeze and foggy at steering NW by W. employed boiling and stowing down. Two ships in sight.

Friday June 14

First part moderate breeze and fine weather at S.E. employed boiling and stowing down. Jamed the ship Champion. and barks Islander & Oliver Crocker. 8 sail in sight. Latter part fresh breeze and fine weather. Two boats crews from the bark Islander aboard breaking out shuck which she thought of no. sail in sight. one of them a cutting and one a whaling.
