

Ship Ship St. George of New Bedford in the Arctic Ocean  
Sunday Sept 23<sup>rd</sup> /66

Sight gales from N.W. and clear weather ship under Double reefed Topsails all hands employed Stowing Oil in the Main Hold ten sail in sight at 4 P.M. lowered for a Whale chase him three rising and then came on Board, ten sail in sight

Monday Sept 24<sup>th</sup> /66

Strong double reefed Topsail breeze from N.W. with cloudy weather and some snow. at 4 P.M. lowered for a Whale, but saw nothing of him after the Boats were lowered the 2<sup>nd</sup> mate in jibing his sail got capsized, and by the time they were picked up and brought on board the Ship, one of them was insensible through the cold and being half drowned and two others were partly out of their head the wind was blowing a double reefed Topsail breeze at the time and the Thermometer stood at 20. in a sheltered place the Boats and the outside of the Ship were all covered with ice Campbell, McIntyre, and Matthew. Lee, of duty through the effects of it

Tuesday Sept 25<sup>th</sup> /66

Strong wind from N.W. and clear cold weather ship under Double Reefed Topsails, lowered twice for Whales, but owing to the wind being so strong they could not be seen from the Boats more than half the time three sail in sight John Adams, boatswain to the Larboard Boat, off Duty sick William W. Howland off Duty, Sick

Wednesday Sept 26<sup>th</sup> /66

The first part moderate winds from N.W. and cold freezing weather at 5 P.M. took a Whale to the Larboard Boat at 11 P.M. finished cutting, at 11 A.M. saw plenty of Whales going to the Windward quick, lowered three Boats without success

Thursday Sept 27<sup>th</sup> /66

Moderate winds from south and fine weather spoke the ship Arnolda of N. Bedford at 5 P.M. began boiling, at 7 A.M. the wind sprung up from the N.W. in a sudden gale, Steered S.E. in company with the ship Arnolda, ship under close reefed Topsails

Friday Sept 28<sup>th</sup> /66

Begins with a strong gale from N.W. with thick snow and cold freezing weather at 4 P.M. <sup>(Main)</sup> luffed to the wind on the Port tack, under close reefed <sup>(Main)</sup> Topsails the middle a heavy gale from N.W. at 2 A.M. finished furling and tied up, at 7 A.M. Steered S.E. the Arnolda in company

Saturday Sept 29<sup>th</sup> /66

The first part a fresh gale from N.W. and thick snow squalls ship steering S.E. under close reefed Topsails, the ship Arnolda, in company with us the latter part light gale from North all sail set steering South by West
