

Wednesday June 12th 1844.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light Westerly breeze
steering E. by N. under all sail. Saw one sail.

So ends the last 24 hours & the Captain thought it best
to call the Lat. $36^{\circ}57'$ N. Long. $40^{\circ}56'$ West.

Thursday 13th.

Begins & Ends with a light Westerly breeze steering E. by N.
Saw Pinbacks too numerous to mention this time.

Lat. by Obs. $37^{\circ}56'$ N. Long. by Obs. $38^{\circ}44'$ W.

Friday 14th.

Begins with a light Westerly breeze. M. & L. part.
Moderate Southerly breeze. Steering East saw one sail.

Lat. by Obs. $38^{\circ}43'$ N. Long. by Obs. $37^{\circ}03'$ W.

Saturday 15th.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light Southerly breeze.
Steering E. by S. spoke ship Chio Loin Sapharou.
15 days out clean bound to N. Island. Saw one sail.

Lat. by Obs. $39^{\circ}08'$ N. Long. by Obs. $35^{\circ}25'$ W.

Sunday June 16th 1844.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light Southerly breeze.
steering Easterly. Saw four sails.

Lat. by Obs. $39^{\circ}31'$ N. Long. by Obs. $33^{\circ}54'$ W.

Monday 17th.

Begins pleasant & nearly calm heading E. No part
of the Southerly breeze heading E. by S. L. part light
Southerly breeze heading E. by S. E. at 6 A.M. saw
the Isles of Flores bearing E. S. E. distant 45 miles.
Saw 12 sails.

Lat. by Obs. $39^{\circ}52'$ N. Long. by Obs. $32^{\circ}12'$ W.

Tuesday 18th.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light Southerly breeze
steering towards land. Saw several sails.

Wednesday 19th.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light breeze at 7 A.M.
Capt. went ashore on the North Side of Flores to recruit
ship.

Thursday 20th.

Begins & Ends pleasant with a light breeze lying off
& on the N. E. side of Flores. likewise the ship Captain
Haber. N. B. 1 month out clean & ship Helvetia. N. B.
clean.
