

Remarks on Tuesday May 26th 1835

First part fine weather wind W.S.W.
middle part the same latter light air
from west sighted no whales this concludes
Mr. Burden unwell Lat. in 36.36
and 3 men Long in 74.09

Remarks on Wednesday May 27th 1835

Commences with fine weather at 2 P.M.
Sighted Schooner Laurell at 4 The Set
Coalers for whales at a boat 6 miles Dist.
Lowered sighted the whales going quick
to windward did not get up with them
latter part fresh breezes sighted several
sail the Schooner Laurell cutting this
concludes Lat. in 36.39
Long in 74.15

Remarks on Thursday May 28th 1835

Commences with fresh breezes at 1 P.M. at 4 P.M.
Spoke Schooner Rose of Halifax for New Bedford
at 6 Spoke with Gen. Pike of New Bedford
had taken nothing middle part squally latter
part fine weather the Gen. Pike in sight
this ends the sick getting better
Lat. in 36.41
Long in 74.00

Remarks on Friday May 29th 1835

Commences with light breezes at 1 P.M. and
fine weather middle part squally latter
part strong gales ship under double reef
topsails this ends Lat. in 36.40
Long in 73.40

Remarks on Saturday May 30th 1835

First part strong breezes at 1 P.M. ship under M.
topsail fairsail latter part moderate breezes at 1 P.M.
sighted several sail this ends Lat. in 36.18 Long 73.41
Gen. Pike in sight

Remarks on Sunday May 31st 1835

Commences with light air and calm
middle part calm latter part very
light air sighted no whales this ends
Lat. in 36.28
Long in 73.50

Remarks on Monday June 1st 1835
first part light air and fine weather
sighted blackbird lowerd took more middle
part weather the same latter part fresh
breezes at 7 Spoke Barque ship from
Philadelphia for New Orleans ship head-
ing to the Eastward this ends
Gen. Pike in sight Lat. in 36.37
Long in 73.30

Remarks on Tuesday June 2nd 1835

Commences with with fresh breezes at 1 P.M.
ship heading East by compass middle part
squally latter part the same spoke with Brig
Orion of Rochester 48 days out 200 barrels
this concludes J.P. in sight Lat. in 36.50
Long in 74.35

Remarks on Wednesday June 3rd 1835

First part light air and calm spoke
ship George Porter for New Bedford with
1200 barrels oil also Gen. Pike middle
and latter part light breezes and
calm this ends Lat. in 37.45
Long in 74.00

Remarks on Thursday June 4th 1835

First part calm sighted blackbird
lowerd got 2 middle part light
air latter part fine breezes sighted
nothing this ends J.P. in sight
Lat. in 38.20
Long in 66.30
