First part light winds with rain
at 1 took the whale to the ship and
commenced cutting at 4 finished
middle and latter part strong gales
at South sighted a whale but too
rough to lower thus ends employed
in boiling; Lucas in sight

Thursday Nov. 5 1835

First part strong gales at South
middle and latter part more moderate
sighted no whales employed in boiling
thus ends Lucas in sight

Lat. in 37.40

Long in 24.00

Friday Nov. 6 1835

70 These 24 hours fresh breezes at the South
and squally ship heading to the Eastward
at 4 both finished boiling latter part
employed in blowing down thus ends saw
no whales Lucas in sight Lat. in 37.35
Long in 22.40

Saturday Nov. 7 1835

First part fresh breezes at the South
ship heading East latter part wind East
and blowing fresh sighted no whales thus ends
Lucas in sight Lat. in 37.05
Long in 22.10

Sunday Nov. 8th 1835

All these 24 hours strong gales at
N.E. & E. ship heading S.E. thus ends
Lucas in sight Lat. in 38.14
Long in 20.00

Monday Nov. 9th 1835

These 24 hours strong breezes
at the N.E. ship heading
S.E. sighted no whales thus ends
Lucas in sight Lat. 39.00
Long 19.30.

Tuesday Nov. 10th

Commenced with strong gales at N.E.
ship heading S.E. under Mr. Lofthall &
Haysails latter part wind N.W.
and moderate sighted no whales
thus ends Lucas in sight
Lat in 39.50
Long in 19.50

Wednesday Nov. 11

First part light breezes at the
N.W. and thick latter part
fresh breezes at East ship heading
N.E. & E. thus ends sighted no whales
Lucas in sight Lat in 39.34
Long in 19.40

Thursday Nov. 12

These 24 hours commenced with fresh
breezes and foggy ship heading to N.W.
latter part fresh breezes and squally sighted
several whales saw and did not pursue saw the
Lucas coat part thus ends Lat. 39.10 Long 19.40
