

Remarks on board Barque Vaphe
Tuesday Aug 3-1852

First part passing squalls of wind and rain. Saw two sails Middle and Latter part working up between the Islands of St George and Graciosa saw nothing of note. At 12 A St George bearing W. & W. Dist 10 Mills

Wednesday Aug 4-1852

First part light winds and rain. Saw a French Brig standing to the Eastward. At sun set shorten sail Middle and Latter part wind and weather the same 2 sails in sight

Lat by Obs 29-21 N

Thursday Aug 5-1852

First part strong gales & squally from W. At 12 A were ship to the Eastward. A sail in sight Middle part wind and weather the same Latter part light gales. At 10 A saw the Island of Fayal bearing S by E Dist 20 Mills

Friday Aug 6-1852

First part strong gales & squally from W. At Sun set Fayal bearing S by E Dist 15 Mills heading to the westward. Middle part keep off for Fayal to land the Captain as he is sick. Latter part at 9 A sent a boat in to land the Captain. At 12 the boat came on board again and then stood out to sea

Cruising of the Western Island Capt How

Saturday Aug 7-1852

First part light gales and pleasant weather from the W. heading of the wind to the W. Middle and Latter part going off on on the back side of Fayal. Saw Grampases

Sunday Aug 8-1852

First part strong gales from Westward. At 3 A spoke the Barque Helen Ouzgah of Old Town 50 A of W. C. Middle and Latter part laying off on on the town of Fayal. At 4 A sent the boat in shore after the Captain but he was not able to come on board. At 11 A the boat came off and then stood out to sea

Monday Aug 9-1852

First part strong gales from W. & W. heading to the Westward saw 2 sails. At 4 A made ship to E. Middle and Latter part wind and weather the same. Two sails in sight

Tuesday Aug 10-1852

First part light gales from W & E Under all sail heading E. S. E. At 5 A saw Sp. Whales in company with the Helen August. Landed 3 boats but without success. Middle part calm. Latter part light gales heading in for the land. At 9 A spoke ship Thomas Jackson of N. Bedford clean
