

Remarks on Board Bark Sarah B. Holt 1877

Saturday Nov 3

this day begins with light winds from the south east ship going round and round very pleasant the day spent the bark Tomerlonge captain Briggs has his wife  
Lat 27-04 lon 22-52 W  
nothing doing to day saw cat fin back

Sunday Nov 4

this day begins with light north east trade winds with pleasant weather ship steering south by west under all sail Lat 26-44 lon 22-50 W  
Bark Tomerlonge in sight

Monday Nov 5

this day begins with strong north east trade winds with pleasant weather ship steering south by west under all sail at two o'clock changed the course to south south west  
Lat 24-30 lon 22-40 W  
employed broking out for seal north Bark Tomerlonge in sight

Tuesday Nov 6

this day begins with strong north east trade winds with pleasant weather ship steering south west by south half south under all sail  
Lat 22-15 lon 23-04 W  
nothing doing to day saw grampus

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Wednesday Nov 7

this day begins with strong trade winds with pleasant weather ship steering south south west under all sail Lat 19-18 lon 24-12 W  
employed in cut fish saw a school of black fish to day

Thursday Nov 8

this day begins with strong north east trade winds at eleven A.M. raised land at night in boat 15 miles off ship steering different courses between south and south west at four P.M. steered at south west ship under all sail Lat 16-40 lon 25-51 W  
employed broking out for flour and small stores

Friday Nov 9

this day begins with strong north east trade winds with pleasant weather raised the island of fog at day light at twelve M. arrived at noon and the night went ashore boat arrived back at five P.M. brosed forward and stood on the port deck until six o'clock each ship and stood for the westward employed broking out weather in the fore noon two ships in sight the George & Susan and the Jay head

Saturday Nov 10

this day begins with strong north east trade winds with pleasant weather layings of sail in pt broad fog went ashore at night at ten and back at two P.M. with four boys and some oranges two sailors deserted the ship and put more land appeared three stowaways at sunset ship standing to the westward under all sail to port
