Tues 4th

The first part of these twenty four hours we had a strong westerly wind. It calmed down by night & the latter part was a drizzling rain.

Fri 7th

These twenty four hours were fair with a moderate N.W. wind

Crew employed scraping line
Hove up anchor at 3 A.M. & steamed along coast

Sat 8th

The first part of these twenty four hours we had a strong westerly wind. By sun down the wind had moderated but it began to rain & we had it steadily the remainder of the time

Clark raised a Rite whale but we lost run of him

Sun 9th

The whole of these twenty four hours were fair, with a light northerly wind during the first hour, or light calm & light westerly wind during the latter hours

52-00

Mon 10th

The first part of these twenty four hours were fair, the latter part a drizzling rain but no wind.

Raised a Rite whale & hove up the boat. It being calm we had to pull the whale hawser in by hand, so we saw no more of him

52-2 in shore

Tues 11th

These twenty four hours were cloudy with a light easterly wind. spoke an Argentine cutter Capt. Roth a boat & went aboard

Raised a Rite whale but the cutter seeing him also was trying to show him to us & so probably galled him for we saw nothing more of him after lowering the boat going at the rate of 10 miles an hour

In shore

Wed 12th

The first part of these twenty four hours we had a strong N.E. wind the night calm & a light westerly wind the latter part

Thurs 13th

The first part of these 24 hours we had some rain with a moderate S.W. wind the latter part the wind became very strong

Discovered near the mouth of the Salager river at 2 P.M.
