Thurs. 3^d

The first part of these twenty four hours was fair, with a light northerly wind, the latter part was foggy.

A steamer named "W. Carey" in the morning, bound through the Strait.

Fri. 4th

The first part of these twenty four hours was foggy, with a light northerly wind, the latter part was clear, wind light.

Sat. 5th

The first part of these twenty four hours was fair, with a light northerly wind, after sun down the wind hauled to the westward, & by morning back to the westward again.

Cape Virgin

Met with a pilot whale, we lowered the boat, but lost him, there being with a high sea.

Sun. 6th

The first part of these 24 hours were hazy, with a moderate northerly wind. It commenced clearing up by 11 P.M. & the latter part it blew a gale from the N. until about 11 A.M. when it moderated some, the wind hauled to the westward.

Mon. 7th

It commenced to breeze on strong again after noon, & by 2 P.M. was blowing a gale from the westward for the rest of the twenty four hours.

These twenty four hours were more moderate, the latter part fair & a moderate westerly wind.

Took an observation at 8.00 A.M. in the morning & an other at 4 P.M. Sighted land N. of Cape Fairweather at 1.00 P.M.

Thurs. 10th

The whole of these twenty four hours were fair, with a moderate N.W. wind.

Cruising close in shore between Cape Fairweather & Coy Inlet.
