and my little boat. During the time we cut away his feet and fly jib gages when our depredations were made. The wind had died away so the current being as an opposite direction kept her stem to the wind. She then made some head and went ahead of us but soon came down and our forward side she no longer lowered our boats down in the midship confusion but as good luck would have it she did not touch. Sanger being over she hoisted the boats up again and put her own anchor. We had scarcely finished it when the French Captain held us and requested us to go in search of his boat which had been stolen by some of his crew (or by the natives) during our neighborhood intercourse. His boats being on deck so we lowered a boat with some warhoops and confusion and went in search. They had not been gone more than ten minutes before we were hailed again by the French Captain informing us that others of his Hawaiians were overboard and we soon heard him crying for help so we lowered another boat with hand capps and a bundle of clothes tied to him. The current ran so strong he could not hold his own in water. His biggest like a good fellow not to be carried on board of his ship but the boat soon delivered him on board of his prison where the Captain flogged him and put on other iron on his legs and showed him in the sun. Our other boat returned at 10 without the runaway it being too dark for success. He ends the most exciting day of the voyage. The water came off before.

Monday March 18th 1855
Dawned beautifully but the day has been disgraced by our drunken mate who returned from the shore at 11 in the morning and insulted our Cookman with the worst of threats in the fondest language. The Hawaiian ship has been reported as well as a wreck for both ships company but distant damage. I was on shore on liberty with the water to get clear of all the confusion. Had a good sermon from the 113th. The 5th were being of the water attacked. Church was returned at about all sober.

827
Tuesday March 19th
At 7 in the morning the French ship for Maunaloa another small boat sailed first and that too on our harbor side which endangered our boats very much but we succeeded in getting them into the water and then kept off with pole for a half an hour when she concluded we were opposed to the first and left us. We was not doing for we faint like to be disturbed in the night. At daylight we have short and the French man took one of his anchors down and separated the ship for good. All hands busy to day some stowing the black powder, some blacking benches, some tarring head stays and the Carpenter and cooper repairing damages occasioned by the collision. Finished off and washed off before supper. Several ships went out and as many came in. The Carpenter repairing the boats for the north.
