Bound For the Sandwich Islands

Thursday 19 first part light winds from the Westward steering ESE saw a sail to the Southward employed at drying home Middle part had light winds from SE steering by the wind to the ESE latter part blowing great with rain blowed at the fly gibbe but made out to save the pieces of observations

Friday 20 commenced blowing a gale from N.E. steering by the wind to the SE under short sail middle and latter part the same all the forenoon to the rain for 24 hours

and latter must be clear 78:39 Lat Long 180 71
and long the same as yesterday Middle and latter part more moderate with steady rain

Saturday 21 commenced with light winds from the Southward with heavy rain at 4 o'clock tacked to the Southward Eastward middle part winds light and baffling latter part fine breeze from the Southward with clear weather employed at repairing fly gibbe Lat 40:37
Long 179:23

Sunday 22 commenced with fresh breeze from the SE steering by the wind to the ESE middle part the same latter part light air from the Southward had under heavy swell the water is covered with shells and Portugas Abanours employed at repairing main topgallant studding

Monday 23 this day commenced calm the old saying is that a calm is half of a fair wind so we live in hopes that the next breeze we get will be fair we are very short of provisions so dogs would consume every particle there is in the ship saw a few grasshoppers and a few fish Bent topgallant to the mast

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Middle part calm latter part had light winds from the Southward steering to the SE crossed fore and main topgallant yards bent and set the sails

tacked to the ESE at 3 P.M. hauled South blowing fresh steering ESE latter part the same

she pitched away her fly gibbe and back reefs employed at washing ship Lat 39:38 off

and cleaning Whaling gear Long 167:58 off

and doing small jobs on the rigging so kind

Thursday 26 commenced with fresh gales from the Southward steering ESE employed at washing ship
