

Ship Sea  
Laying at Lohina Moani Sandwich Islands  
November 1854  
Wednesday 8 commenced with fine weather  
employed at receiving freight received 20441  
from ship condor of New Bedford and 8000  
from ship Brutus of Warren the bark  
Egilant left for short cruise and  
home latter part employed taken bone  
from several ships

Thursday 9 commenced with fine weather  
employed at taken bone from several ships  
I spent the evening on board the Brutus  
to look out for the ship I have had a chance  
to go mate of her for another season  
latter part taken bone from different ships.

Friday 10 commenced with fine weather  
employed at receiving bone from differ  
ent ships the ship Ocean had 900  
lbs rather small for 14 months  
I made a bargain with captain Swift  
in ship Brutus for the 20 say and  
150 dollars advance

Saturday 11 commenced with fine  
weather employed at receiving  
bone at 6 o'clock with the Brutus hauled  
along side to discharge oil employed  
at receiving oil from the  
Brutus

Sunday 12 commenced with fine  
weather employed at  
receiving oil from ship Brutus  
at 6 AM she hauled off to wait  
till Monday middle and latter part  
had very strong trades several ships dragged  
off shore at 8 o'clock I left the harbor  
watch went on shore

the George Washington arrived she sails 1800  
Monday 13 commenced with strong  
trades several ships dragged  
the Jefferson went off so she  
had to make sure to get back

Middle and latter part blowing strong  
received no freight  
Tuesday 14 commenced with strong trades  
middle part more moderate latter part  
the Brutus hauled along side to discharge  
oil several of our gang got there dischur  
ged

Wednesday 15 commenced with fine  
weather employed at taken oil from  
ship Brutus at 8 o'clock I left the  
Brutus hauled away for fear of bad weather  
latter part of the day had some  
rain and strong breeze from the West  
ward

Thursday 16 commenced with  
Bad looking weather has some rain  
several ships reefed their topsails and  
made preparations for a blow  
at sundown the weather looked better  
say 6 ships get under way  
in employment as it was to expect to  
receive freight
