

148 La Prairie Oct-29th 1854

Aug 22th this day commenced with a light
light breeze laying of and on at Sahaina
at daylight we were about four or five miles
to the north westward of the shipping. about
9 AM. Mr. Jackson and Mr. Graham came
of and worked the ship up the anchorage
after a long length of of time. about 6 PM
came to anchor in 12 fathom of water gave
the 45 fathom of chant and furled the sails

Jan. 1850. This day commenced with a light & still evening. attended service twice. light breeze at 12 M. the steamer tode with us. accompanied by William P. Bond in Weather down anchor. no one Mont employed to day in sending boats aloft to go ashore to day from the topsails and courses. and stowing them ship. a great number of ships in bay in the cabin. at night washed harbor.

Sweet Nov. 1st this day was pleasant
 this morning the bar low small
 rain in evening we received 6 letters
 to day 4 to make one by ship.

Went out this morning all hands white skin and 10 hands
