

May. 17 AD 1840.

Sunday the 17 comes in with light air and calm  
 all round the English variable part light air from  
 South Western S. E. Breeze from East 10 miles  
 rather part air & with of course light breeze from  
 S. W. & E. with calm at one several in the 4-5  
 Lat 34-0 Lon 79

Monday the 18 comes in with light breeze from  
steering E S E saw several humpback inside  
fast strong breezes latter part strong breezes from  
N E steering E S E attended with rain & clouds

Thursday the 28<sup>th</sup> comes in with a fair calm breeze  
the company at 1 P.M. were shown off to the shore  
all our shouts and give chase Capt. Russell struck  
in and in him by cutting the line with the ax  
he went at right angle aboard took up the  
boat and key of for Tula Yana bar four miles  
and continued pulling up the bay after part  
of the night ashore with the ship beating up the  
mouth of the river. Ran South 30 ends

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Friday the 22 comes in with light air from South  
lay off and on in the harbor at night came two  
sloops of the town mid day part calm latter part  
discharged one man by the name of Baker. I  
looked over and shipped another in his room we took  
our anchor but the wind being light we let it go  
again so ends in Takahuaná

Saturday Sunday the 24 comes in with calm at 5 P.M. At light breeze sprays us from the Westward. At 6 we took our anchor again in company with the New England of Poughkeepsie in old part light air standing out the bay rather part light fair in in steering. At 8 P.M. we several fishing barks so ends lat 36 50 long 75 25.

Monday the 25 comes in with moderate breeze  
from N. steering S. at 4 P.M. spoke the  
Boston wh cutting to sixty S.W. at night  
strong breeze from S. came down to double  
reef spritsail in middle part attended with rain  
till in the fore and. morning sail covers and got  
out light breeze and the top sail again - lay S. W. 3/4  
attended with rain 2 ships in sight on end Lat 35-3/4

Tuesday the 26 comes in with strong breezes from S. W. lay M. & A. rainier at night the wind shifted to the Westward steered N. W. by S at 1 A. M. she the Westacomb hoiling her whole middle part the same latter part set the top sails and course employed in 3 days duty as ends Lat 34.20 Long 74.20
