Thursday September the 3rd
this 24 hours comes in with light breezes from
Chutt standing in for the North head of
Albarmar at 4 P.M. sent the boat in
and caught some fish at night stood off
shore & under the topsails latter part
boat in for Narbough & end Narbough
bearing N.E. distant 15 miles

Friday September the 4th
this 24 hours comes in with light breezes from
North one boat went in shore at Narbough
on wood at night brought off two boat loads
of wood at 8 P.M. luffed two with the
sloop aback North head of Albarmar bearing
S.W. distant 21 miles the South head of
Narbough bearing S.W. 15 miles the middle
part the same latter part made all
sail for the North point of Narbough sent
two boats in for wood and more then com-
ing sailed to end in Banks bay

Saturday September the 5th
this 24 hours comes in with light breezes from
employed in getting a wood at night and
and stood out the way with light
winds from the Northward middle
part the same latter part stood in
shore for Narbough in fine weather
brought some fish

Sunday September the 6th
this 24 hours comes in with light breezes
S.E. and pleasant beating up for the
South head of Albarmar at 5 P.M.
got up the Minerva Chute
of New Bedford & mounted
out 400 lb middle part
stood in shore latter part
made all sail at 1 P.M. tacked ship
by S.W. Narbough bearing S.W. distant
12 miles & ends 2 men sick

Monday September the 7th
this 24 hours comes in with light breezes
from S.W. by S.W. at night tacked
lay in East South head of Albarmar
bearing S.E. distant 30 miles middle
part the same latter part run down
along Narbough saw nothing but stuck
fish so ends 2 men sick

Tuesday September the 8th
this 24 hours comes in with light winds
from S.E. steering S.W. employed
in ship's duty at night stood the
above ship middle part strong breezes
lay S.W. latter part tacked in lay
by S. North head of Narbough bearing
S.W. distant 25 miles & ends
2 men sick
