

Bound for Sandwich Island
from the 14 to the 23 nothing material
to be seen or heard... on the 23 we find ourselves
in the latitude $18^{\circ} 23'$ & Longitude $154^{\circ} 11'$ by
Chronometer, Monday, being the 24 day of
May... at 3 A.M. we saw the Island of
Onyhee, bearing N. West distant 3 leagues
Tuesday the 25 ran down for for Karahakooa
the 26 day of Karahakooa Town, the 27 on
shore the 27 ran down for Karahakooa Town, and
anchored, one man on shore; the 28, after, doing
our business, and being visited, by the natives of
the Island, who are enough, to set a comor man, with
with the hubbet they make --- we take our
anchor, and shaped our course for Noonee, and
on the 30 about 7 P.M. we drop our anchor, off
Kakeina, Town, in 17 fathoms water, coral
bottom. This Island, lays in about $20^{\circ} 34'$ degrees
North and Longitude $154^{\circ} 54'$ West, with mild
pleasant, climate, their chief product is, taro
and, potatoes, unios, coconuts, are found here
but scarce, the inhabitants, are mostly natives
of dark complexion, there are a few whites, with
them, mostly missionaries, they have, a school
college, about a mile from the town, with
about 60 pupils, they have a ministers reading
room, but what use they put it to, for
not to several times, and always found it locked
there are several other building after the American
style, the most noted, is the, Kings Palace
but as yet unfinished, after lasing, their
it dark, and painting ship, and getting all things
ready for sea, we take our anchor, and ran
down for the Island, off Poroo, and on the 14
between the hours of 6 and 7 A.M. we drop our anchor

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at the bar off Poroo harbour, in 25 fathoms water
the Peacock, U.S. store of war being handy ran down
to the harbour, and anchored, getting material going
to all hands, have a rod ashore, the boat, is the
best, and largest, of the Sandwich Island, being laid
out in squares, with here and there a house in the
European style, which makes in all, a fine appearance, at the
first sight, the inhabitants, seem one mixture of all
colors, half whites, half blacks, and harrackars, and the
most dissipated, of any of the Islands. for there is about
a money go shops and gambling houses, as in many of our
shops, the trade here is carried on by the whites, who
come here for the purpose of making their fortunes, which
they accomplish, in about ten or fifteen years, it is
very poor in health, they become weak and debilitated
therefore they must return to America, again, to gain
their health, but can they accomplish it, their lamp
of life begins to burn dim, and they find themselves
the door of the grave; and are obliged to give up
the idea of returning to that dreaded place; and thus
ends their life. --- and so we leave them to proceed on
our voyage, aft get what few things we needed in port
we drop our anchor on the 22 of June, we and
proceed to Island of Aooi --- about two degrees fort west
of Poroo, this is a small Island chiefly inhabited
by natives, their chief produce is sugar cane, and tobacco
the hills and mountains, abound with wild bullock, and
goats, after getting a supply of boys goats, and potatoes we
shaped our course for the 29, with light
breeze and, for prospect of get cargo of oil, nothing
material occurring till in the 6 of July, at about 7 A.M.
that we saw a shole of sperm Whales, we board three
but give chase, and about noon, we had the good luck
