

Sandwich Islands 1843

Thursday January the 5

comes in with light breeze standing in shore, at night the boat went in at Enchow, middle part ran down for Kiohuan, latter part stood of shore --- two men sick, so ends

Friday January the 6 begins with light breeze, at 2 PM, spot A schooner, Pua, Honolulu, three day from Pohna, at 4 PM the tug boats went on shore, at Kiohuan, got 2 hogs, 5 turkeys, and several barrels of sand, middle part stood of shore, latter part, employed in fitting rigging, so ends, two men sick

Saturday January the 7 attended with light breeze, and pleasant weather, middle part fine latter part, employed in getting of yams, at Enchow --- so ends, two men sick

Sunday January the 8 this day comes in with light air and calm; off Enchow, within 1/4 quarter of 1/2 miles, middle part, steering Northward, latter part, at 11 AM, took the N.E. trade, lay N.W. by North, so ends two men sick

Monday January the 9 comes in with light trade, sat for topmast steering sail, at 5 PM, passed tomorrow in 17 fathoms water, middle part beating up for Pohna town, latter part, the Captain went on shore, ship lay off and on so ends, two men sick

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Tuesday January the 10

attended with light breeze at night after having all thing on board we shape our course for Pohna, middle part by S, latter part calm, ten miles from Diamond head, so ends two men sick

Wednesday January the 11

comes in light trade standing in for diamond head; at night the Captain went on shore at Pohna, middle part lay off and on, latter part, at 1 PM came two in 12 fathoms water

Thursday, one boat on shore, at Honolulu

Friday the same --- Saturday, 14, first part employed in getting our passengers, and freight on board, at 5 PM, after having a good assortment on board; we, take our anchor with a fine N.E. wind and shape our course, for the Island of Hawaii through the night, the five breezes but to rough sea, which makes it rather inconvenient for the land of loafers, that emigrant to the Sandwich Islands, seeking for wealth, latter part part as we draw along to the place of anchorage, all seem to be in good cheer; to think what a noble ship they have to, boat them round from land to land; however I am in hopes that, in a short time we shall make a bold push for the States; at noon drop our anchor in 11 fathoms water, and give her 80 fathoms scope --- so ends, four men sick --- laying at Ato
