 Remarks Sept. 1, 1833 Sunday
 These 24 hours commenced with fine
 breeze from S.W., all sail set steering
 S. by W. flying clouds, nothing in
 sight.
 Middle part pleasant weather.
 Latter part fine trade wind
 from S.W. and flying clouds, -
 all sail set to best advantage, -
 all well except the boy.
 1 Month 6 days out
 Var 1 pt West Lat 11° 55' N

Remarks Sept. 2, 1833 Monday
 These 24 hours commenced with fine
 breeze from S.W., all sail set steering
 S. by W. flying clouds.
 Middle part pleasant weather and
 fine breeze. Lat by Moon at 2 P.M.
 10° 27' N
 Latter part flying clouds and fine
 breeze, steering S.W. in expectation
 of making Land, employed in ship
 duty. All well except the boy. -
 1 Month 7 days out
 Var 1 pt West Lat 11° 26' N

Remarks Sept. 3, 1833 Tuesday
 These 24 hours commenced with
 cloudy weather and fine breeze
 from S.W. at 1 P.M. saw the
 Island of St. Anthony (S. Cape Verde)
 at 6 P.M. the North point bearing
 S.W. 1/2 S. 2 leagues dist. from which I
 correct my Longitude. -
 Latter part moderate winds, all sail
 set steering S.W. a sail in night stern
 employed in securing out Main hold
 after hatch. All well except the boy.
 Var 1 pt West 1 Month 8 days out Lat 15° 24' N

Remarks Sept. 4, 1833 Wednesday
 These 24 hours commenced with flying
 clouds and fine wind from S.W.
 Middle part light wind and flying
 clouds.
 Latter part moderate winds, and
 very warm and pleasant, all sail
 set, employed in fitting a fore stay
 out of the old Main stay, and
 other jobs. - a sail in night stern.
 Var 1 pt West Lat 13° 57' N
 1 Month 9 days out

Master bound on a Whaling Voyage, in South Atlantic
 Remarks Sept. 5, 1833 Thursday
 These 24 hours commenced with pleasant
 and very moderate weather, winds from
 the Northward all sail set steering S.W. 1/2 S
 Middle part light air from North
 Latter part light winds, very warm
 and pleasant, all sail set to best advan-
 tage, employed in tarring down the new
 backstay, and new fore stay.
 Cooper is busy employed in making small
 casks, other necessary work going on. -
 1 M. 9 days out
 Var 1 pt W Lat 13° 57' N

Remarks Sept. 6, 1833 Friday
 These 24 hours commenced with pleasant
 weather and light winds from North
 all sail set below and aloft steering S.W. 1/2 S.
 Middle part moderate winds from
 N.W. jibed ship.
 Latter part fine breeze, all sail
 set steering S.W. saw a sail standing
 on a wind to the North East. -
 one of them appeared to be an English
 Man of War, - employed in mending
 job. 1 M. 10 days out
 Var 1 pt W Lat 14° 30' N

Remarks Sept. 7, 1833 Saturday
 These 24 hours commenced with cloudy
 weather and fine breeze from N.W.
 all sail set below and aloft steering
 S.W. Middle part variable and
 light winds. Latter part light winds
 from the Northward and unequal of
 rain, sail set accordingly, employed
 making backstay, masts, and at work on
 other necessary jobs. All well on board
 1 M. 11 days out
 Var 1 pt W Lat 10° 00' N

Remarks Sept. 8, 1833 Sunday
 These 24 hours commenced with fine
 winds from W.S.W. and pleasant.
 all sail set to best advantage.
 Middle part fine breeze and flying
 clouds. Latter part pleasant and
 fine winds in standard, wind S.W. 1/2 W
 a sail in night stern heading to the
 southward. All well on board
 Var 1 pt W 1 Mo. 12 days out
 Lat 8° 30' N
