

Ship, *Shylock* Log Book, *Clement* *Flammarion*
 March 20 1834 Thursday
 These 24 hours commences squally weather from the S West steering to the N West at sunset took on sail. Latter part squally with her from the North at daylight made sail and saw a sail on the weather beam here being to the Westward

March 21 1834 Friday
 Lat 26-30 S
 These 24 hours commences with the wind from the north and south and squally steering to the north at sunset took on sail heading to the eastward at daylight made sail the latter part strong breezes

March 22 1834 Saturday
 Lat 25-15 S
 These 24 hours commences with the wind from south heading to the eastward at 1 P.M. sent the main sail and were ship heading to the S W and set the reef on the topsails and set the main top gable sail for some the middle and latter part fine breezes from the south the watch employed in ships duty Sat

March 23 1834 Sunday
 Lat 26-12 S
 These 24 hours commences with strong breezes from the south steering to Westward at 4 P.M. backed ship heading to S E at 6 P.M. the crew at the fore and middle parts went to down and bent a weather. The middle and latter part light winds from the south and calms at 10 P.M. were hit heading to the N West 2 1/2 pts bar height

March 24 1834 Monday
 Lat 26-24 S
 These 24 hours commences with light winds and calms heading to the E S East the middle part slight winds from the South the latter part light winds and calms at 10 P.M. took the current gauge the current setting to the N East the watch employed in repairing the fore top sail

March 25 1834 Tuesday
 Lat 26-21 S
 These 24 hours commences calms and light winds the middle part calm the latter part light winds from the N West heading to S West

March 26 1834 Wednesday
 Lat 26-20 S
 These 24 hours commences with strong breeze from the South East at 2 P.M. took ship heading to the N E at 6 P.M. took on topsails and at 3 P.M. looking for black fish did not get past the middle part heavy squalls from the South at 9 P.M. took the fore and main topsails and set the fore and main shrouds strong gales from the S East heading to the S West

March 27 1834 Thursday
 Lat 26-20 S
 These 24 hours commences with heavy gales from the S East heading to S E at 2 P.M. took the fore and main topsails close reefed at 10 P.M. set on deck but the fore sail set the gale at 11 P.M. split the gale the latter part strong gales from the S East steering on the wind to the S E 1/2 S

March 28 1834 Friday
 These 24 hours commences with strong gales and heavy squalls from the South the middle part moderate but the top and the topsails and set fore top gale sail the latter part strong gales and heavy squalls with rain the wind from the S E heading to the S E 1/2 S at 9 P.M. took away the fore top mast string, back yard and dunt the main top gale sail

March 29 1834 Saturday
 Lat 27-50 S
 These 24 hours commences with calms and squalls and rain cloud down the topsails and took two reef in them at 2 P.M. strong breezes from the S East the middle and latter part breezes from the East steering S West the watch employed in ship's duty

March 30 1834 Sunday
 Lat 28-25 S
 These 24 hours commences with fine breezes from the East and pleasant weather steering to the S W at 3 P.M. sent for water saw black fish the middle part fine breezes from the East the latter part fine breezes and clouds weather steering Westward

March 31 1834 Monday
 Lat 28-20 S
 These 24 hours commences with a fine breeze from the East heading to S W at 1 P.M. took the wind from the S W in squall cleared down the topsails and took two reef in them heading to the N West the middle and latter part the same heading to the N W the wind from the South

April 1 1834 Tuesday
 Lat 28-29 S
 These 24 hours commences with fresh gales from the S W heading to the N West the middle part the same the latter part light winds and calms heading N by S saw a sail head to star

April 2 1834 Wednesday
 Lat 28-27 S
 These 24 hours commences with with light winds and calms at 2 P.M. took a fine breeze from South the middle and latter part strong gales from the Eastward steering to S by South at Day light saw a sail of the *Labrador* now heading to the N

April 3 1834 Thursday
 Lat 28-27 S
 These 24 hours commences with strong gales from the Eastward steering to the N by S at 4 P.M. raised a heavy sea steering S by S gales and fore top mast steering sail gale the middle part strong gales from the N East the latter part heavy winds from the N West on the wind to N West 2 1/2 pts bar height

April 4 1834 Friday
 Lat 28-27 S
 These 24 hours commences with heavy gales from the Westward heading N W in under a double reef topsails middle part the same at sunrise and bent the fore top sail and bent a weather the latter part heavy wind from the South steering N by North
