

22. *Bark Smyrna of New Bedford, Mass.*

Help.

Thursday March 2nd 1854.

Begins with fresh breezes from N. N. E. heading E. with the fore top gallant sail and gaff topsail in, saw great quantities of hbl, middle part heading E. N. E. the weather some hazy, latter part brisk breezes from N. N. W. heading N. E. under all sail except the fore top gallant sail, saw a brig steering about S. E. So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 34. 40. Long. By \odot 6. 48. 00" W. Bar. 30.1.

Punishment.

Friday March 3rd 1854.

Commences with brisk breezes from N. N. W. heading N. E. with the fore top gallant sail in, middle and latter part brisk breezes from N. and N. S. W. steering E. N. E. and N. E. by E. saw a Bark steering to the S. E. at about 8 A. M. punished Augustus Smith by whipping him with two parts of nine thread worm line, gave him twelve blows across the back and shoulders, for making two threats that he would stab some of the men in the fore-castle, also gave Michael Riley six blows across the back and shoulders with the same piece of line, for being saucy and using insolent language. Strong Breeze.

Saturday March 4th 1854.

Begins with fresh breezes from N. S. W. steering E. by S. with the fore and main top gallant sails out, middle and latter part strong breezes from S. W. and S. S. W. steering E. by S. with the main top gallant sail out. Bar. 30.2.

So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 31. 55. S. Long. By \odot 1. 36. 15" W.

Heavy Swell.

Sunday March 5th 1854.

Commences with moderate breezes from S. and a heavy swell from the S. W. heading E. by S. under all sail except the gaff topsail and fore top gallant sails, middle and latter part brisk breezes from S. S. E. and S. E. heading E. and E. N. E. with the fore top gallant sail and gaff topsail in, at noon tacked to the S. W. They cook still off duty. Bar. 30.4.

23. *Towards the Cape of Good Hope. A. D. 1854.*

Cloudy.

Monday March 6th 1854.

Begins with moderate breezes from the S. E. and cloudy, heading S. W. by S. with the main top gallant sail and flying jib set, middle part wind from E. S. E. latter part light breezes from E. and cloudy heading S. S. E. under all sail. So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 31. 58. S. Bar. 30.5.

Long. By \odot 00. 29. 30. E. By Lunar. \odot 26. 15. W.

Main Braces.

Tuesday March 7th 1854.

Commences with very light breezes from E. and pleasant, heading S. S. E. under all sail, rose new main braces (24 in. 18 fath. each) middle part calm, latter part light breezes from E. heading S. S. E. under all sail, and saw a school of porpoises. So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 32. 38. S. Long. By \odot 1. 15. 15. E. Bar. 30.4.

Spun yarn.

Wednesday March 8th 1854.

Begins with very light breezes from E. N. E. heading S. E. under all sail, the watch employed on spun yarn, middle and latter part very light baffling air and calms, steering S. E. when we had a breeze. Broke out for Cheese. Bar. 30.3.

So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 32. 54. Long. By \odot 1. 51. 45. E.

French Barge.
Main Rigging.

Thursday March 9th 1854.

Commences with very light airs from N. E. and calms, steering S. E. one sail in sight, middle part calm and baffling, latter part light breezes from N. E. steering S. E. with the topmast studding sail out, spoke a French Barge from Bordeaux for Melbourne, and set up the main rigging. Bar. 30.2. +.

So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 33. 22. Long. By \odot 2. 52. 45. E.

English Brig.

Friday March 10th 1854.

Begins with moderate breezes from N. E. steering S. E. in company with a French barge, and broke out for flour and bread, middle and latter part steering the same course with wind from N. N. E. and N. exchanged colours with an English Brig. So ends &c. Lat. By D. R. 34. 15. Long. By \odot 5. 34. 00. E. Bar. 30.1. +.
