 156. Skimmer. Saturday May 13th 1854.
 Begins with very light breezes from E. heading N. E. under all sail, the Mars and one other whaler in sight, middle part heading to the Northward under easy sail, latter part light breezes from E. heading S. S. E. under all sail, the blacksmith fitted the skimmer.

157. Porpoises. Sunday May 14th 1854.
 Commences with light breezes from E. heading S. by E. under all sail the Mars in sight, and saw great many porpoises, middle part heading N. E. under double reefed topsails and courses, latter part very light airs from N. N. E. heading to the Eastward under all sail, saw a finback and grampuss.

158. All sail. Monday May 15th 1854.
 Begins with light breezes from N. heading E. N. East. under all sail, middle part light breezes from the S. West steering N. E. under double reefed topsails, latter part light breezes from S. S. E. heading to the N. E.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 25. 31'. Long. By \odot 107. 49. 00'. Bar. 30. 3.

159. Canhook Strap. Tuesday May 16th 1854.
Dead Eye.
 Commences with light breezes from S. E. heading N. E. by E. fitted new can hook strap, and in a new lower dead eye for the starboard main topmast backstay, middle part laying under short sail, latter part wind from E. S. E. heading to the N. E. under whole topsails and courses.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 25. 02'. Long. By \odot 108. 30. 45'. Bar. 30. 2. +.

160. Stitching the jib. Wednesday May 17th 1854.
 Begins with wind from E. S. E. heading N. E. with the fore top gallant sail and gaff topsail in, the blacksmith busy on iron work, middle part very moderate, latter part calm, sent in the jib and middle stitched it.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 30'. Long. By \odot 108. 42. 15'. Bar. 30. 2. +.

 161. Finbacks. Thursday May 18th 1854.
 Commences with a calm, middle part very moderate, latter part light breezes from S. S. E. heading to the Eastward under all sail, and saw several finbacks.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 30'. Long. By \odot 109. 09. 45'. Bar. 30. 2.

162. Breaches. Friday May 19th 1854.
 Begins with wind from S. S. E. working to windward for two breaches that we saw off the weather beam, middle part laying to the S. W. under short sail, latter part strong breezes from S. S. E. heading to the Eastward under double reefed topsails and courses.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 10'. Long. By \odot 110. 18. 30'. Bar. 30. 2.

163. Double Reefs. Saturday May 20th 1854.
 Commences with strong breezes from the Southward and rugged, heading to the Eastward under double reefed topsails and courses, middle part heading to the S. W. under reefed topsails and courses, latter part fresh breezes from E. S. E. heading to the N. E. under a whole main topsail, double reefed fore topsail and courses.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 08'. Long. By \odot 110. 39. 30'. Bar. 30. 2. +.

164. Rugged. Sunday May 21st 1854.
 Begins with strong breezes from the S. E. and rugged heading N. E. under reefed topsails and courses, middle part heading to the S. W. under short sail, latter part brisk breezes from the S. E. but moderating, heading S. S. W. under double reefed topsails and courses.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 29'. Long. By \odot 110. 25. 45'. at 10. A. M. By Lunar. 112. 04. 45'. Sun East.

165. Deck Buckets. Monday May 22nd 1854.
 Commences with moderate breezes from S. E. and pleasant overhead, standing S. S. W. and saw a finback, middle part heading to the S. W. latter part light breezes from the Eastward heading N. E. the Cooper making deck buckets, the Carpenter plugging the main hatches, the remainder of the watch at sundry jobs.
 So ends &c. Lat. By obs. 24. 43'. Long. By \odot at 10 A. M. 109. 56. 45'. By Lunar. 110. 53. 00'. Bar. 30. 2.
