Beef & Pork. Commenced with brisish breezes from E. N. E. and N. E. and squally with rain, heading to the Northward under double reefed topsails and courses, at 3 P. M. wore round to the S. E. and headed that way till 2 P. M. under easy sail, latter part brisish breezes from N. E. steering from S. S. W. to N. S. W. under double reefed topsails and foresails, saw a finback, and broke out a cask of beef and one of pork from the after hold.

Begins with very moderate airs from the Northward, so that the current has control of the "Dmyria", one sail in sight, and saw a sulphur bottom, middle part moderate, latter part light breezes from N. to S. S. W. heading in shore with the main top gallant sail out, saw one sail too leeward (Sonia) and started flour. So ends 3c. Lat. By obs. 24.00'. Long. By Ac. 49.14.30'.

Friday Dec. 7th 1855.

Cakum. Continued with brisk breezes from the Southward, gave
a breach and tack'd for it, the watch employed picking up hump,
at 3 P.M. tack'd to the Westward again, saw a finback, middle
and latter part light breezes from the S. and pleasant, gave one sail and a breach.
S. end of Lat. by obs. $23^{\circ} 54'$. Long. By $48^{\circ} 3\frac{1}{2}' 00''$.
