Water.Thursday April 3rd 1856.

Commenced with light breezes from S. and pleasant heading N. by E. under all sail except the fore top gallant sail and gaff topsail, saw a finback and three sails, and a school of porpoises, at sunset another sail off our lee beam, middle part laying to the S. W. under easy sail, latter part light breezes from S. E. heading E. N. E. employed breaking out for beef, pork, and water, and saw four sails.

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 24° 30'. Long. By A. 107° 59' 15"

One Sail.Friday April 4th 1856.

Begins with light breezes from S. E. heading E. N. East under all sail except the fore top gallant sail, one sail in sight too windward, middle part moderate, latter part light breezes from E. N. E. steering N. N. W. under all sail on the fore and main masts, saw one sail.

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 26° 59'. Long. By A. 107° 52' 30".

Elisha Dunbar.Saturday April 5th 1856.

Commenced with light breezes from the N. E. steering to the Westward, at 4 P. M. spoke the Bark Elisha Dunbar 415 tons, middle part strong breezes from N. N. W. and main, latter part fresh gales from N. S. W. heading to the N. W. under double reefed topsails and foresail, saw one sail too leeward.

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 27° 04'. Long. By A. 107° 42' 45".

Eclipse.
One Sail.Sunday April 6th 1856.

Begins with strong breezes from S. S. W. and regged heading to the Westward under a double reefed main topsail and foresail, started a cask of bread and saw an Eclipse of the Sun, middle part laying to the Westward and S. W. under the same sail, latter part light breezes from the S. E. and a heavy swell from the S. W. steering N. W. with the top gallant sails out, saw one sail standing to the Eastward.

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 26° 45'. Long. By A. 107° 05' 15".

Main Topsail.Monday April 7th 1856.

Commenced with moderate breezes from S. E. heading N. E. by E. under all sail except the fore top gallant sail, middle part laying under short sail, latter part light breezes from S. S. E. heading to the S. W. with the main top gallant sail out, bent the cotton main topgill and repaired the Russia one that we sent down, at about 10 A. M. the 1st Officer's dignity was imposed upon owing to my giving orders to the 3rd Mate without referring the 3rd Mate to him, he goes the world.

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 26° 39'. Long. By A. 106° 53' 45".

Coffee.
India.Tuesday April 8th 1856.

Begins with moderate breezes from S. S. E. of 3 P. M. talked to the Eastward, one sail in sight (started coffee) at dusk spoke the Ship India of New Bedford 84 months out 550 wh. 100 sp. and another sail in sight too leeward, middle part laying to the Eastward under short sail, latter part moderate breezes from S. S. W. and S. W. heading to the S. E. with the main top gallant sail out. So ended. Lat. By Obs. 26° 57'. Long. By A. 107° 55' 45".

Finback.
Two Sails.Wednesday April 9th 1856.

Commenced with brisk breezes from N. S. W. and a very heavy swell from the S. W. heading to the Southward under the topsails and courses, two sails in sight, and saw a finback, middle part laying to the Southward under easy sail, latter part strong breezes from S. S. West heading to the Westward under double reefed topsails and foresail, and saw two sails. So ended. Lat. By Obs. 27° 09'. Long. By A. 107° 30' 30".

Three Sails.
Two Dolphins.Thursday April 10th 1856.

Begins with strong breezes from S. S. W. heading to the Westward under double reefed topsails and courses, fitted new straps to the fore lift blocks and saw two sails standing to the Eastward, middle part heading to the S. E. latter part fresh breezes from S. W. steering N. E. under double reefed topsails and foresail, saw three sails and two dolphins. (Saw Hark.)

So ended. Lat. By Obs. 27° 03'. Long. By A. at 5 P. M. 108° 05' 30". Lunar 107° 47' 45".
