

193. *Harb Marnys fo Denderbouf, Amss.*

924. *N. Finbacks.*

Thursday June 19th 1856.

Begins with unsteady breezes from S. S. W. to S. S. E. and some squally heading to the Eastward, finished stowing twenty-five bls. of oil and cleaned the starboard side between decks, saw several finbacks, middle part moderate, latter part light breezes from E. S. E. heading to the S. E. under all sail except the spanker.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 24° 11'. Long. By A. 108° 28' 00".

925. *Jumpers.*

Friday June 20th 1856.

Commences with light breezes from E. S. E. heading N. E. under all sail except the spanker, and saw a Cape pigeon, middle part laying to the Southward under easy sail, latter part brisk breezes from the Eastward steering from N. W. to W. under reefed topsails and foresail, saw jumpers, a finback and one sail.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 23° 29'. Long. By A. 108° 24' 30".

926. *Dead Whale.*

Saturday June 21st 1856.

Begins with fresh breezes from E. S. E. heading to the N. E. under reefed topsails and courses, saw spots too windward but did not ascertain what they were, middle part moderate at 11 A. M. saw a dead sperm whale, sent a boat to him and found him to be very much blasted, latter part brisk breezes from E. S. E. heading to the Southward at about 8 A. M. passed the same whale again and ascertained that he was in a very bad state, so bad that we did not take him alongside.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 23° 50'. Long. By A. 108° 25' 45".

927. *Humpback.*

Sunday June 22nd 1856.

Commences with wind from E. S. E. steering from N. S. W. to N. W. under double reefed topsails and foresail, at sunset shortened sail and hauled on the wind to the N. E. and headed that way through the night with fresh breezes from E. S. E. latter part strong breezes from E. S. E. and cloudy steering from N. W. to W. under double reefed topsails and foresail, saw a humpback, two Cape pigeons and one sail.
So ends. Lat. By D. R. 23° 05'. Long. By D. R. 108° 00' 00".

194. *To a Halving Torrey. A.D. 1856.*

928. *Fale & Rainy.*

Monday June 23rd 1856.

Begins with strong breezes from E. S. E. and rainy, laying under a double reefed main topsail and foresail, heading to the Southward one whaling bark under our lee, middle part fresh gales from E. S. E. to N. E. and rainy, heading from S. to E. under a double reefed main topsail and spencers, latter part heading to the S. W. under the same sail.
So ends. Lat. By D. R. 23° 30'. Long. By D. R. 108° 10' 00".

929. *Jumper & Sail.*

Tuesday June 24th 1856. (June 25th Dream of Home.)

Commences with fresh gales from N. E. heading to the N. W. under a double reefed main topsail and spencers, middle part wind from the N. W. and starlight, latter part moderate breezes from N. S. W. heading to the N. W. with the main top gallant sail out, saw a jumper and one sail.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 24° 02'. Long. By A. at 9 A. M. 108° 06' 15".
By Lunar at 9 A. M. 108° 42' 15". By A. at 3 P. M. 108° 00' 00".

930. *One Sail.*

Wednesday June 25th 1856.

Begins with brisk breezes from N. S. W. heading to the N. W. with the main top gallant sail and flying jib out, one sail in sight too leeward, middle part wind from the Southward, latter part brisk breezes from S. S. E. heading to the S. W. under all sail except the spanker, and saw a humpback.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 23° 52'. Long. By A. at 9 A. M. 107° 41' 45".
By Lunar at 9 A. M. 108° 10' 15". By A. at 2 P. M. 107° 28' 45".

931. *Main Topsail. Strong Current.*

Thursday June 26th 1856.

Commences with brisk breezes from S. S. E. heading to the S. W. with the main top gallant sail out, employed repairing the cotton main topsail, middle part laying to the S. S. W. under double reefed topsails and foresail, latter part light breezes from E. S. E. steering S. S. W. with the main top gallant sail and flying jib out, employed on the main topsail, and saw humpbacks, the Cooper busily employed making and fitting breakers.
Wind a strong current setting to the N. E.
So ends. Lat. By obs. 24° 17'. Long. By A. 107° 16' 00".
