<p>1132. <u>Dolphin.</u></p>	<p>Tuesday Jan¹⁴ 1857. Begins with moderate breezes from the S. E. steering N. E. W. with the main top gallant sail out, and caught a dolphin, middle part laying to the Eastward under short sail, latter part wind from S. E. heading to the S. W. under the topsails and courses, nothing of the sperm whale heard these 24 hours. So endg. Lat. By obs. 25° 23'. Long. By obs. 48° 08'. 15'. Bar. 29.8. t.</p>
<p>1133. <u>Brisk Breeze.</u></p>	<p>Wednesday Jan¹⁵ 1857. Commences with brisk breezes from S. S. E. heading S. W. by N. under the topsails and courses, middle part laying to the Eastward under short sail, latter part wind from the Southeast steering S. E. by E. with the main top gallant sail out. So endg. Lat. By obs. 25° 11'. Long. By obs. 48° 46'. 00'. Bar. 29.8. t.</p>
<p>1134. <u>Jumpers.</u> <u>Fresh Gale.</u></p>	<p>Thursday Jan¹⁵ 1857. Begins with fresh breezes from the S. S. W. and equally with a very heavy swell, bearing from the Eastward, over under double reefed topsails and courses heading to the S. E. saw two jumpers, (Bar. falling) middle and latter part fresh gales from S. S. W. to S. W. and equally with rain bearing on the Southern tack under a close reefed main topsail and fore sail. So endg. Lat. By obs. 24° 55'. Long. By obs. 49° 19'. 30'. Bar. 29.5. t.</p>
<p>1135. <u>Fresh Gale.</u></p>	<p>Friday Jan¹⁶ 1857. Commences with fresh gales from W. S. W. to W. heading S. and S. S. W. under a close reefed main topsail and fore sail, middle part laying W. S. W. under a close reefed main topsail and spencers with fresh gales from S. W. latter part wind from S. W. and more moderate. So endg. Lat. By obs. 24° 54'. Long. By obs. 49° 25'. 30'. Bar. 29.7.</p>
<p>1136. <u>St. G. Mast.</u></p>	<p>Saturday Jan¹⁷ 1857. Begins with brisk breezes from N. W. heading W. S. W. under double reefed topsails and courses, middle part raining with thunder and lightning, latter part light breezes from the Northward steering to the Westward, struck the fore top gallant mast and put in a set of iron dogs, two sails in sight. So endg. Lat. By obs. 25° 00'. Long. By obs. 48° 38'. 15'. Bar. 29.8.</p>
<p>137. <u>Drift Wood.</u> <u>Four Sails.</u></p>	<p>Sunday Jan¹⁸ 1857. Commences with light baffling breezes from S. E. to East and cloudy heading to the Northwest and Southwest with the main top gallant sail out, sent down a Russia topsail from forward and bent a cotton main topsail in its stead, three sails in sight, and saw a piece of drift wood, middle part wind from N. E. heading E. S. E. under short sail, latter part with breezes from N. E. and smoky, heading N. N. W. under single reefed topsails and courses, and saw four sails. So endg. Lat. By obs. 24° 38'. Long. By obs. 48° 35'. 30'. Bar. 29.8.</p>
<p>138. <u>Three Sails.</u></p>	<p>Monday Jan¹⁹ 1857. Begins with brisk breezes from E. or N. E. heading S. E. under reefed topsails and courses, saw a Bark pass under our lee supposed to be the Clara Bell of Math. middle part laying to the S. E. under short sail, latter part brisk breezes from N. E. and smoky heading N. N. W. under double reefed topsails and courses and saw three sails. So endg. Lat. By obs. 24° 38'. Long. By obs. 48° 29'. 15'. Bar. 29.8. t.</p>
<p>139. <u>Herald.</u> No. 2 letter In 38839.</p>	<p>Tuesday Jan²⁰ 1857. Commences with brisk breezes from N. E. and smoky, heading N. S. W. at 8 P. M. saw sperm whale that had been troubled by the Eugenia and Herald to windward in the evening had a gam with the ship Herald of N. E. 1400. out, 400 lbs. sp. middle part laying to the Eastward under short sail, latter part brisk breezes from N. E. steering W. S. W. and W. under double reefed topsails and fore sail, over the Herald heading to the Northwest, at 11 P. M. saw a breach off our weather bow. So endg. Lat. By obs. 24° 55'. Long. By obs. 48° 00'. 45'. Bar. 29.8. t.</p>
<p>140. <u>Mr. Butter.</u></p>	<p>Wednesday Jan²¹ 1857. (Whale visiting N. W.) Begins with brisk breezes from N. E. at about 11 A. M. lowered three boats for the whales that we saw in the forenoon starboard boat struck one and the iron broke, then struck and killed another, at 5 P. M. hauled him alongside and were ready to haul off shore, middle and latter part moderate at 6 P. M. looked on and commenced cutting, at noon had off body and jib in, boundg. Lat. By obs. 25° 22'. Long. By obs. 48° 09'. 45'. Bar. 29.8.</p>
