All these hours steady breeze from the W. steering
N.E. by N. first part all sail out middle
and last part wind increased and top sails set in
gale by day sail 25

Wednesday 28

Strong breeze from the W. steering N.E. by N. very
rainy with a high sea on the wind. Landing
about four points north and then which
collected it all up in a large wind on the day

Thursday 29

First part strong breeze with heavy shower
of rain at 5 wind shifted N.W. steering
N.E. by N. nothing more worth noting for the day

November Friday 30

At fine wind from the N.E. steering
N.E. by N. at this day employed in getting
the cutting gear ready for action to give

Saturday 1

Strong breeze from the N.E. standing
on the wind with the L. board. tanks
on board heading about N.W. by N. 25
squalls of rain perpetually with a great
a heavy sea running to end the day

Sunday 2

Wind about the same with a pleasant
of rain at 4 o'clock set the fore speaker

Monday 3

First part strong breeze squally at
5 o'clock top in the fore top sail last part
wind abated set the top sail 25

Thursday November 4 - 1844

All this day fine weather with the wind
to the N. and W. steering N.E. by N. nothing
in sight of any consequence,

Wednesday 3

Fine weather the wind N.W. steering N.E. by N.
all hands employed in ships duty right
out a spirit of the year 25

Thursday 4

This day fine weather with a light wind
from the N. steering N.E. by N. 25 nothing in sight

Friday 5

Weather as usual light winds from the N.
and E. heading to the N. all hands employed
in ships duty 25

Saturday 6

All these 24 hours fine weather with the
wind N.E. standing on the wind heading
to the N. and E. all hands worked on board

Sunday 7

This day the wind N.E. steering on the
wind to the eastward at one o'clock saw a
Bark come very near to us at 6 o'clock saw
a sperm supposed to be a grampus latter
part squally with wind N.W. steering N.E. by N.

Monday 8

Fine weather with the wind N.W. steering N.E. by N.
with all sail out at 4 o'clock saw a school of porpoise
all hands employed in ships duty 25
days out to sea and no whales in sight yet
our lamp oil is getting low so that we are
for this day
