

Monday, December 18 - 1835

Time weather but a strong breeze steering different courses than we set at a 1/2 sail, a breeze or white water & this day employed in mending sails &c.

Tuesday 19
Light winds from the N.W. steering N.W. nothing of any consequence for this day

Wednesday 20
Light winds calm and raining nothing in sight of any consequence

Thursday 21
First part light wind from the N.W. steering N.W. last part strong breeze steering the same & this day employed in mending sails

Friday, January 1 - 1836

All this day strong winds from the N.W. steering N.W. nothing very remarkable all hands employed in ship duty such as breaking out for water, potatoes and the potatoes arrived & saw a light at 11. Put thought it was a whaler boiling so ended the day

Saturday 2
First part sailing saw a whaling bark bound N, middle fine weather at 8 it sent down the fore top gallant yard & last part strong breeze South reef top sails so ended the day

Provisioned to the river before
Sunday January 3 - 1835

This day commences with strong gails from the N.W. steering N.W. until 8 then have to under short reef main top in fore upmast and fore top mast stay sail with the starboard tacks on board so ends the day

Monday 4
This day commences with a strong breeze from the N.W. standing on the wind heading to the N. middle lighter winds set the top sails and ship steering N.W. fine weather & employed in mending sail at 3 both shot a single eye hoyet &c.

Tuesday 5
Time weather the wind N.W. steering N.W. saw a turtle board the boat for dinner without success at night took in sail hoping to with the starboard tacks on board heading to the N.W. so ends the day

Wednesday 6
This day fine weather but no wind saw a turtle so ends the day

Thursday 7
Light winds from the N.W. steering N.W. the night nothing in sight very remarkable excepting a turtle that we saw

Friday 8
First part equally with rain much and last part fine weather nothing in sight all hands employed in ship duty
