

Thursday January 8th - 1845

Strong breeze from the N. standing on the wind heading to the E. and W. will sail out, saw porpoises and white water, a plenty of birds, but in spite of night as usual, had at least employed in ships duty

Friday 9th
Light winds fine weather saw a plenty porpoises but no whales

Saturday 10th
Fine weather with N.E. standing but saw a number birds of different kinds but no gulls or albatrosses seemed the day

Sunday 11th
Wind N.E. standing to the S. and the water very smooth at 10 o'clock a number birds in abundance but no whales

Monday 12th
This commences with fine weather light winds and calm water. at the night sprung up to the N. and at 1 P.M. it blowing a gale at 1 P.M. sent some albatrosses a dove to under short reef top sail with larboard tack on board until 3 o'clock a sea broke the general of the vessel but so did the day

Tuesday 13th
Fine weather but a heavy sea on nothing in sight short stories

Wednesday January 14th - 1845

This day commences with a light breeze from the N. standing on the wind heading to the N. and at 1 P.M. sent some albatrosses a dove to under short reef top sail with larboard tack on board until 3 o'clock a sea broke the general of the vessel but so did the day

Thursday 15th
This day commences with fine weather light winds. at 1 P.M. sent some albatrosses a dove to under short reef top sail with larboard tack on board until 3 o'clock a sea broke the general of the vessel but so did the day

Friday 16th
At 11 this day employed in boiling & strong breeze from the N. heading to the N. with starboard tack on board the heaves still along side

Saturday 17th
Strong winds but fine weather still holding at 1 P.M. hooked on one of the heaves and took it in lost part heavy sea rather in part time one for this work to stow down to barrels of oil so ends the day
