

Thursday January 19th 1845

First part employed in boiling at 8 commenced stirring down at 4 P.M. cooled down the works middle part raising at 10 the middle watches made 4 watches so ended the day

Monday 20th
All here all hands at 4 P.M. 8th hooked on the other side took it in at 10 commenced boiling at 12 hours the junk cut up at 2 P.M. with at 4 P.M. cooled down the works for these whole during weather here had nothing more very special for this day

Tuesday 21st
Light winds and rain all hands employed in stirring down at 4 P.M. cleared out of decks stores down about 6 P.M. 8th of wind. 8 P.M. standing on the wind with foreward tack on board so ended the day

Wednesday 22nd
First part quiet moderate weather all hands at sunrise commenced stirring down at 10 cleared the decks for this day with 11 P.M. middle and last part stirring down from the 10th 8th standing to on the 10th reef main top sail for spencer and top mast stowed it with the foreward tack on board so ended the day

Thursday January 23rd 1845

This day commences with a strong breeze and heavy sea with nothing in sight

Friday 24th
Fine weather saw a sail at five P.M. speak to her proved to be the bark London packet Capt. Rowland of New Bedford 3 months out 150 tons so ended the day

Saturday 25th
All these 24 hours fine weather but no fish so ended the day

Sunday 26th
Commenced with a light breeze from the S and S. standing different courses at 10 P.M. speak the ship Remondus of Bristol 92 months out 3900 whole out from home & saw several jumpers so goes the time

Monday 27th
Strong breeze from the W but fine weather nothing in sight so ended the day

Tuesday 28th
Fine weather speak the Bark Emigrant of New London Capt. Chebman three months out (New)

Wednesday 29th
Strong breeze from the W steering different courses cruising for the fish but without success so ended the day
