Ship Vineyard of Edgartown bound to
Wednesday March 28th 1855.

This day commences with light breezes and pleasant weather from the N.E. ship under main sail steering W. by N. Middle and latter part the same. Lat. 15° 1' N. Long. 147° 22' E. So ends this day.

Thursday March 29th 1855.

This day commences with light breezes and pleasant weather from the N.E. ship under all sail steering W. by N. At daylight made the land sight ahead, and at 4 P.M. took the pilot, and proceeded into the harbor, where lay the anchor at sunset. Went aboard the French ship, Genl. Teste and got a doctor for our shipmate. Went aboard the Consul. So ends this day in port.

Friday March 30th 1855.

Since the last date the laboring watch have had their liberty: they came aboard Wednesday afternoon, and the starboard watch went ashore. Employed in taking wood aboard, ten cords in all, and fresh provisions. So ends this day in port.

Saturday March 31st 1855.

Smoked the ship this morning in search of runaways, but found none. Took a boatload of sweet potatoes in the forenoon, and in the afternoon another load and also a load of bananas. About dark the liberty men came off, with the exception of the blacksmith who has been missing a day. Equally weather. The Montpelier sailed this afternoon. So ends this day in port.

Sunday March 11th 1855.

Browsed several ships in search of the blacksmith but with no success. The Arab sailed this morning. Weather quite squally. Went aboard the Consul.

Monday March 12th 1855.

Ran the catfall involved tackle preparing to

the island of Guam. Thomas N. Fisher ¹⁸⁵⁵ taking the anchor to morning. Smoked the ship but discovered no one. Took a boat load of potatoes aboard. So ends this day in port.

Tuesday March 13th 1855.

Yesterday afternoon found the blacksmith aboard the Eng. Bark 'Mary', and brought him aboard. Acquired man known as 'Jemmy Duck' ran away last night, but was found aboard the Bark 'Cassack' this morning. At 10 A.M. took the anchor and proceeded down the coast to Umatac Bay to get water where we arrived soon after midday. Sent one raft of 8 casks ashore. Found the 'Phoenix' of New London here and soon after we let go the 'Young Victor' arrived. The 'Phoenix' sailed in the afternoon. So ends this day in Umatac Bay.

Wednesday March 14th 1855.

Sent a raft of 14 casks ashore and stowed down the first raft. Took a boatload of potatoes aboard, and sent a raft of 16 casks ashore. Steaming down all day. So ends this day in port.

Thursday March 15th 1855.

Sent a raft of 6 casks ashore. The 'Junior' and 'Abigail' of New Bedford arrived and the 'Young Victor' sailed. Took the anchor at midday and went to sea, Guam being S. by W. So ends this day.

Friday March 16th 1855.

This day commences with strong breezes and rugged weather from the N.E. ship double reefed topsails and foresail steering N. Middle part set the jib and main sail. Latter part the same. So ends this day.

Saturday March 17th 1855.

This day commences with strong breezes and rugged weather from the N.E. ship under ^{damaged} main sail steering N. Sent down the royal masts and yards. Latter part shook one reef out the main top sail.

Sunday March 18th 1855.

This day commences with light breezes and pleasant weather from the N.E. ship under all sail
