

Friday March 11th 1889

Strong breeze from N.E. all sail set
standing by the wind N.W.

Middle part much the same,
Satter part more wind at N.W.

hauled light sails, thus ends,
Latitude 13° 15' North,
Longitude 150° 25' West,

Saturday March 12th

Strong trades from E. & E. Ship,
under 3 sails and courses steering
N.W.

Middle part the same,

Satter part strong trades from East
and squally, at 11 double reefed the
N.E. sail, thus ends,

Latitude 13° 10' North,

Sunday March 13th

Strong trades and rugged cloudy rainy
weather from East Ship under double
reefed 3 sails courses and jibs,
steering N.W.

Middle and Satter parts the same,

Latitude 13° 21' North,

Longitude 152° 52' West,

Monday March 14th

Strong breeze and rugged from East
Ship under double reefed 3 sails, steering
N.W. at dusk saw sperm whales going
quick to windward,

Middle part more moderate,

Satter part set all sail, course West
one sail in sight, steering the same,
at 10 P.M. saw the East part of
Hawke, bearing N.W. 1/2 S. and about
about 10 miles, thus ends,

Tuesday March 15th 1889

Strong breeze from N.E. all sail set
running down the land, at 2 P.M.
blowing on, strong got in the light
sails, at 3 as we dragged round
the land, began to lower in gust
called all hands and took in all
sail, except fore topmast stay sail
in some of the reefs it blew hard,
the large to windward about 8 miles
the other ship up there laying the
same as ourselves,

Middle part rather more moderate
made sail as the weather would
admit,

Satter part wind backing, all sail
set working towards the anchorage
at 11 P.M. was on shore, at noon
half a gale of wind got in sail
to two double reefed 3 sails,

Wednesday March 16th

Wind backing at 1 P.M. got to anchor
at 3 had the receipt all on board,
if I have not passed it before day
then I never did, I have been going
to sea some time but I never see
things go as they do here, the Capt.
good on shore, tells me he is not
going to anchor, sent a man off
here without any order to anchor the
ship, let her up,

at 5 land breeze

Satter part strong breeze from
seaward, the other came
in to anchor, thus ends,
