

Sunday June 26th 1854

Light wind and pleasant weather from South, all sail set steering W. N. W. 6 sail in sight at 6 P.M. gam'd with the Cook for poor ones together, Middle and Latter part light wind and pleasant, steered Easterly, some 11 sail, spoke the Sava of New Bedford rigging full of love to day, such sights makes us poor fellows feel down, the ships that was here had had a fine spell of whaling, but we got here just in time to see them boiling their last whale,

Monday June 27th

Light wind and cloudy from South, all sail set steering N. E. 1/2 S. 11 sail, one hauling, Middle and Latter part light wind and variable, all sail set heading towards the ice, this evening
Latitude 63° 52' North,

Tuesday June 28th

Light wind and pleasant from S.E. all sail set steering N. E. along the ice, 1 number sail in sight, the Gay Head amongst the number, Middle and Latter part moderate and thick same of the time, in and along the ice looking for whales, but it does not look as though there was ever a whale here; this evening

Wednesday June 29th 1854

Moderate breeze and cloudy from N. W. all sail set steering Southwesterly along the ice 6 sail and a plenty of ice in sight, Cape D'Hervey in sight bearing N. 1/2 E. Middle and Latter part the same, at 9 P.M. spoke the brig K. L. and the Anquilla of Wahoo, at 11 spoke the Hibernia and had an all night gam, this evening, I wish we could see some whales and get some oil but it looks dark just now, I want to get enough to pay the bills of our set of things we have got for a crew, and a little for myself, for if we ever get in there will be an alteration, for I cannot sail with a crew under such discipline, as we are under,

Thursday June 30th

Pleasant weather from W. N. W. all sail set steering S. S. W. the Hibernia and 2 other sail in sight, Middle and Latter part much the same, at 6 P.M. kept off N. E. at 11 gam'd with the Hibernia, this evening.
Latitude 61° 35' North,
