Thursday The 27th

The first part of the twenty four
hours begins with moderate gale gail from
the N. E. and ruff weather we heading
to the S. E. under Short Sail. State weather
at times: much and latter part moderate
gail and Stoddy and thick weather sandy

Friday The 28th

Begins with strong gail from E. N. E.
we heading up S. E. by E. under Short
Sail at 6 Bell Close reef main
top sail and fule the fore sail
Stoddy rainy and thick weather much
and latter part strong gail and ruff
weather sandy

Long by 176.25 W

Saturday The 29th

Begins with moderate gail and very
swell we string: at 6 P. M. under
moderate sail latter part the same

Sunday The 30th

Begins with moderate wind from S. W.
we string: at 6 P. M. under moderate sail
saw fin back: much and latter part
fine sandy

July Monday The 1st

Begins with light wind, from westward
we string to the N. E. Spout back: back:
Abron Backer 12: months out 650
billy all time seen whales yesterday
latter part strong wind and ruff weather
So ends

Tuesday The 2^d

Begins with moderate gail from S. W.
Saw Jumps: Abron Backer again in light
middle and latter part strong wind and very ruff
weather sandy

Lat 40.27 S

Wednesday The 3^d

Begins with moderate gail from the
westward we heading to the westward
brought out fore water and masted: much and latter
part fine weather So ends

Lat 40.57 S

Long by 175.15 W



Thursday The 4th

Commences with moderate wind and fine
weather Saw Spout whale: saw for the
at Sun down return with out success
Struck one but the iron drew out at 8. at 4
Saw whales again going to the Eastward
at 10 at Sun down. Most for the Struck
two and kill them So ends
