Sunday The 19th

The first part of the twenty four hours begins with light winds from Eastward we heading to the northward under all sail inside and latter part the same so ends

Monday The 20th

Begins with light wind from the northward we heading to the Eastward middle and latter part fine sand

Lat 33:22 S

Long 178:44 W

Tuesday The 21st

Begins with light northward wind and fine weather heading to the N.E. in place in ship's duty middle and latter part strong southerly wind sand

Wednesday The 22nd

Begins with strong S.W. wind and thick rainy weather middle and latter part strong wind and rough weather sand

Lat 32:24 S

Long 178 18: W

Thursday The 23rd

Begins with strong wind from S.E. and rough weather heading to the southward under short sail in place in morning sporadic and increasing sail at 5 P.M. saw a bark hawtaker middle and latter part fine sand

Friday The 24th

The first part of the twenty four hours begins with moderate wind from S.E. we heading to the southward under moderate sail in company with Robert Tamm of Sydney 10 months 1000 lbs whole middle and latter part fine sand

Long 177:47 East

Saturday The 25th

Begins with moderate wind from S.E. and fine weather we heading to the southward under all sail in place in ship's duty middle and latter part fine sand

Sunday The 26th

Begins with moderate wind from E.N.E. we heading to the northward westward at 5 P.M. saw a bark holding a whale along side at 6 do we saw a spatter whale going to the northward we heard our two boats for him but could not get to him return at 7 do short in sail and stand to the northward middle and latter part fine sand

Lat 33:26 S

Long 177:54 E

Monday The 27th

Begins with moderate wind from E.N.E. we heading to the southward saw the Cutting middle and latter part fine sand
