Remarks on Board Ship Bart Larnold 1868

February Sunday The 9th

The first part of these twenty four hours began with light southerly wind and fine weather we heading to the westward: Saw the Miller above home Barker and Peck at 5 P.M. at 6 we saw some wharfed: hunted for them: just at dusk the boat started tried on but could not reach him at 8 we return with no success: middle and latter part calm and fine Sunday

Tuesday The 11th

Began, with light easterly wind, in fine Saw Robertson and A. Barker. Chassin sparrow to be whaly at 1000 down saw sparrow whaly but we did not have fore there. being late in night and got fresh wind. Saw a whaly at 6 A.M. at 8 do struck one got one boat stove lost the whaly. So ended
