First part of these 24 hours
Commences with fine weather from
the westward steering W. N. W.
all sail set at sundown more
ship and shorten sail latter
strong winds and heavy seas
cruising for whales so ends

Sunday June 21. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with strong winds and
clear weather from S. S. W. at
sundown tacked ship to S. E.
and shorten sail latter part
moderate winds and squally so on

Monday June the 22. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with fine weather
from the S. W. at 2 P. M. rose
Black fish lowered 2 boats
S. B. got 2. and S. B. got 2. latter
part the same employed
mincing black fish butter
and refasting fore sail so ends

Tuesday June the 23. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with lite winds
and cloudy weather from
from the south at 4. P. M.
x spoke schooner Syria & Seamen
x and a man by the name of
Harry Rodgers shipped on board
of her. latter part bent the foresail and
commenced boiling black fish
blubber so ends this day

Wednesday June 24. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with lite wind and
cloudy weather from the S. S. E.
heading to Eastward with all sail
set at 2 P. M. finished boiling
latter part the same so ends

Thursday June 25. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with squally weather
from the south steering S. S. W.
latter part the same heading by the
wind to Eastward so ends this day

Friday June 26. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with fresh breezes and
cloudy weather latter part strong
winds and heavy seas from the
south at 9 A. M. spoke schooner
A. Talor so ends this day

Saturday June 27. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
More moderate heading by the wind
W. S. W. under short sail latter part
strong winds and rainy so ends

Sunday June the 28. 1865
First part of these 24 hours
Commences with strong winds and
squally from S. S. W. heading by
the wind S. E. at 3. P. M. shorten
sail latter the same so ends
this day
