

Remarks on board Ship *Statira*
Of Nantucket
 From Edgartown to the Pacific Ocean
 On a Whaling Voyage

Sunday November 10th 1838

Letter part cloudy weather with a strong breeze from the North at 8 o'clock AM took our anchor from Edgartown with Mr King as Pilot boat out by West Chop in company with the Ship *Minerva* of Edgartown & sailed with a Snow Storm

Monday - November 11th 1838

First part squally weather with some rain with the wind at North at 3 1/2 PM discharged our Pilot and stowed our anchors with Gay Heads heaving S.W. Middle part blowing strong from the N.E. doubt suspect the Debris stirring South Letter part blowing strong shook out one reef from the Main Debris and set the M.T. & L. Sail Employment stowing the Chains below with a number of our Sailors sea sick saw several Sails of vessels Latitude by Observation 38.10 North

Tuesday November 12th 1838

First part blowing strong from the N.E. course P.S. at night hauled up S.W. Middle part stiff breeze Letter part wind light weather cloudy and all the young Sailors sea sick. S. Rands Employment in fitting the Latitude by

Wednesday November 13th 1838

First part wind light from the E. stirring by the wind to the S.W. weather Cloudy Employment in unrigging up the Ship Middle part at 11 PM took a breeze from the E. & S.W. tacked ship to the N.E. took in the light sails at 4 AM doubt suspect the Debris stirring strong Letter part squally weather blowing a strong double reef Debris from E. & S.W. took 4 tacks with us Employment in fitting boat No. 2 with our young Sailors sea sick Latitude by Gh 36.11 North not correct
