

Remarks on Board Ship Station

Thursday November 14th 1838

First part blowing strong breeze from the S.W. with squally weather under topsails and topsails with a more shift on the lookout took & took with us as the wind varied Middle part blowing half a gale from the S.W. heading to the S.W. with squally weather Latter part strong breeze & very rough heading to the S.W. the most of our young sailors were sick Employed in getting ready for Dec
Latitude of 35. Long of 138

Friday November 15th 1838

First part strong breeze from the S.W. heading to the S.W. under topsails Middle heading to the N.W. & Latter part at the N.W. with a strong breeze & very rough weather
Latitude of 35.17 N Long of Dec 65.10 W

Saturday November 16th 1838

First part blowing strong breeze from S.W. heading East with some of our hands quite smart weather very rough at night took in the N.W. sail and a couple of topsails Latter part wind N. breeze S.W. moderate weather Employed variously some hands still sea sick
Latitude of 35.10 Long of Dec 64

Sunday November 17th 1838

First part moderate breeze from the N.W. & breeze S.W. with most all sail set Employed variously Middle part very squally with rain at 2 P.M. took in the light sails and clouds under the topsails wind N. Latter part more moderate weather thick cloudy wind N.W. & breeze S.W. saw a ship heading S.W. from us & called her the Almira of Holgersten S. Amels
Latitude of 34.57 North Long of 63.18 W

Monday November 18th 1838

First part cloudy weather with a strong breeze from S.W. under single reef topsails and courses with the N.W. sail set our sailors getting better of their sea sickness this day opened a cask of Bread Middle part squally weather at 9 P.M. passed the vessel we called the Almira found her to be a large Barque ship under easy sail Latter part a strong breeze from the S.W. & breeze S.W. weather squally got no observation this day it being rainy observed a barrel of Melafes

From Newtucket to the Pacific Ocean

Thursday November 15th 1838

First part rainy weather with some thunder & lightning and a strong breeze from the N.W. & breeze S.W. with all our young sailors on deck excepting the Stevedore who is still sick Middle part weather Latter part moderate breeze from the N.W. & with all sail set employed in various ways storing Ambers &c
Latitude of 34.48 Long of 138

Wednesday November 20th

First part wind light at 4 P.M. took a strong breeze from the S.W. breeze S.W. Middle part took in the S.W. sails & clouds under the topsails with heavy squalls of rain wind thunder & lightning Latter part blowing strong from S.W. breeze S.W. S. Amels some hands sick
Latitude of 34.42 Long of 138

Thursday November 21st 1838

First part strong breeze from S.W. weather clear Middle part blowing strong with clouds under topsails & courses Latter part light wind from the N.W. with squalls of rain breeze S.W. Employed variously
Latitude of 34.41 Long of 138 started water

Friday November 22nd 1838

First part light breeze from the S.W. with all sail set Employed variously Middle part squally with thunder lightning & rain wind S.W. breeze S.W. Latter part much the same very squally
Latitude of 34.40 Long of 138 52.10

Saturday November 23rd 1838

First part squally tempestuous weather wind S.W. at 3 P.M. saw a Gintack Middle part stormy with a strong wind from S.W. & breeze S.W. Latter part clear & windy and very rough Employed variously all hands
Latitude of 35.55 Long of 138 58.6 W

Sunday November 24th 1838

First part clear weather with a strong breeze from the S.W. breeze S.W. Middle part wind light at 3 P.M. took in the S.W. & at 10 o'clock back to the S.W. Latter light air and a heavy swell from S.W.
Latitude of 34.43 Long of 138
