

Remarks from Cape Horn
Tuesday March 10th 1840

First part good weather with a breeze from the NW at 1 PM struck a large whale at 2 took him to the ship and at night took him all but his excepting his base. Middle part strong breeze from the NW heading to the NW all sails in. Latter part took in the base and wore ship to the NW under 4 having a young gale of wind with rain we cleared the decks and went into the Main Topail & Foresail. S. Enes all night. Latitude of Cap 48.50 Long of Cap 77.50

Wednesday March 11th 1840

First part blowing a small gale from the NW at 4 PM under 4 to 5 course NW Middle part strong breeze at 12 into the Fore & Main Topails at 3 into all sails with a moderate breeze from the NW. Latter part began heaving weather calm. S. Enes this day. Latitude of Cap 48.45 Long of Cap 78.1

Thursday March 12th 1840

First part took a breeze from the NW heading to the NW at night took in all sails Middle part at 8 PM worked down the works with some rain. Latter part blowing strong with rain. Took ship to the NW and at the Foresail. Latitude of Cap 48.50 Long of Cap 78.30

Friday March 13th 1840

First part blowing strong from NW with rain & fog. at night wore ship to the NW under Main Topail & Foresail. Middle part much the same. Latter part began to heave again. Latitude of Cap 48.4 Long of Cap 80.2

Saturday March 14th 1840

First part calm with foggy weather. Middle part rainy. Latter part at 7 AM finished heaving weather clear with a breeze from the NW began steering down oil sea. Latitude of Cap 48.3 Long of Cap 78.30

Sunday March 15th

First part stiff breeze from the NW finished steering off and made sail heading to the NW. Middle part under close reef. Latter part good weather with a light air from the NW. S. Enes. Latitude of Cap 48.40 Long of Cap 78.40

Coast of Chile

Monday March 16th 1840

First part light air from the NW at night took to the NW. Middle part at 2 AM took in the Topails at 3 AM. Latter part close reef the Topails took in. Main sail & 1st. Having strong. Latitude of Cap 48.15 Long of Cap 78.30

Tuesday March 17th 1840

First part blowing strong from the NW at 3 PM took ship to the NW at night took to the NW. Latter part the Waist Boat being suggested we Middle part having a gale took in all sails. Heading W under NW. Latter part at close reef. Topails took to the W under from W to N. Latitude of Cap 48.24 Long of Cap 80.22

Wednesday March 18th 1840

First part strong breeze from the NW weather clear & suggest heading NW. Middle part much the same. Latter part light winds made all sails took to the NW. S. Enes. Latitude of Cap 47.52 Long of Cap 78.58

Thursday March 19th

First part with a breeze from the NW heading NW. at night weather thick took in the NW. Under 4 Topails. Middle part close reef the Topails thick rainy weather under 4. Latter part blowing strong took in the Topails under NW heading to the N. Having a hard gale with a heavy sea running. Latitude of Cap 47.4 Long of Cap 78.60

Friday March 20th 1840

First part blowing a hard gale from the NW heading NW. Middle part at 2 AM began to moderate at the Topails. Latter part wind moderate made all sails under 4. The NW heading NW. Latitude of Cap 48.58 Long of Cap 77.33

Saturday March 21st

First part moderate breeze from the NW heading NW with the on all sail set. Middle part much the same. Latter part equally breeze NW. Wind W at 12 noon wind NW good weather. Latitude of Cap 44.18 Long of Cap 76.40

Sunday March 22nd

First part good weather with a moderate breeze from NW heading NW. at 3 PM saw a sail at 4 PM saw a sperm whale covered with oil. 6th. spoke the Lady Comhurst of London 5 1/2 months 630 W. Capt. Bushells master. Latter saw whales covered & struck. Landed in night. Latitude of Cap 44.14 Long of Cap 76.
