

Journal of a voyage to Horns Bluff
Sunday 5th May 1844.

Came with light air from the South
at 1 P.M. commenced cutting the Whale
at 5 P.M. had the whole all in one ship to the
N.W. and commenced boiling latter part
Hauled over from the South saw a number
of Finback Lat 64 37.48 Long 175. 50 E.

Monday 6th May 1844.

All this 24 hours gentle breeze from South and
fair weather Steering N.W. employed Boiling
Saw finback & porpoise Lat 64 37. 35 Long 175. 40 E.



Small
with 4 very distinct fins

Tuesday 7th May.

Commenced with cloudy weather Steering N.W.
at 3 P.M. finished boiling at 4 P.M. Lat 64
and killed a small Whale which sunk headed
to the N.W. through the sight-music and
latter part thick and rainy heading N.W.
under Short Sail Lat 64 38.00 Long 175. 60 E.

Wednesday 8th May

Thick rainy weather heading N.W. Wind N.
Middle and latter part more moderate and
cloudy Steering N.W. Saw a number of Finback
Steered down to lat 64 38. 30 Long 175. 30 E.

Thursday 9th May

Came with gentle breeze from the East and
cloudy Middle and latter part heavy only
from S.E. and very heavy squally at 3 P.M.
here too had the South at 5 P.M. further main
top sail at 11 A.M. under Ship to the N.E. & E.
So early with strong only from S.E. and very rough
and thick Lat 64 39. 15 Long 177. 10 E.

Ship Statida of 1834 April 1844

Friday 10th May

Strong gale from the South lying to head
E and fell Steered of N.W. Middle and
latter part more moderate by the wind to the
N.W. & N Wind N.W. & Cloudy over darkish
Lat 64 40 35 Long 177. 00 E.

Saturday 11th May

Just breeze from the South and thick heavy
to the N.W. Middle part rainy at 7 P.M. fresh
Ship Harald of Tromsø to 300 lbs latter part
strong only from the N.W. and squally
by the wind to the N.W. under Short Sail.

Lat 64 41 45 Long 177 45 E
0 P 177 15 E

Sunday 12th May 1844

All these 24 hours strong gale from the N.W.
by the wind to the N.W. Middle and latter part
rather more moderate at 7 P.M. under Ship to the
N.W. at 11 P.M. set Close Reef and under
top sail so early with strong wind from N.W. and
rough Ship Harald in sight a stern
Lat 64 42 15 N Long 177 30 E

Monday 13th

Commenced with moderate breeze from the South
and cloudy by the wind to the N.W. Middle part
calm at hold it breeze from the East Steered N.W.
rainy latter part strong only from the S.E. and
passing squally at 11 P.M. fore sail and top
Com too head to N.E. so early with strong wind
Lat 64 42. 40 Long 177. 00 W

Tuesday 14th May 1844.

Strong Windy from S.E. and rain very heavy
Steered N.W. under Short Sail.

Middle and latter part Calm and foggy heading
to the N.W. Saw very barren ground
Lat 63. 05 Long 177 00 W
