Remarks on Friday 8th Nov 1844.

Fresh breezes from the S.E. by the wind to the
S.W. Middle and latter part squally
employed Repairing Sails &c.

Obs Lat 2.53 N. Long 152.00 W

Saturday 9th Nov 1844

All these 24 hours moderate breeze from S.E.
by the wind to the S.W. at 3 P.M. lowered for
Sperm Whales but soon lost sight of them
So every employed Repairing Sails Lat 06.18.00
Long 153.30.

Sunday 10th

Came with light air from the S.E. by the wind
to the South Middle and latter part fine
breeze from E. to N.E. heavy S.E.

Lat 00.00 S Long 153.30 W

Monday 11th

All these 24 hours South breeze from the E. to S.E. by
the wind to the S.W. employed Repairing
Sails &c Lat 06.18.00 S Long 152.50 W
{The Cooks very sick and off duty with Vomiting
and I think poisoned, and Mr. Denham
sick with Dysentery,

Tuesday 12th Nov

Fine trade from the East Steady S.E. employed
Repairing Sails and other necessary & by Cooper
employed Making Small Cask &c Lat 06.30 S Long 152.40 W

Wednesday 13th

Moderate breeze from the S.E. to S Steady South
S.E. fore for Steady Sails So every employed
Repairing Sails &c Lat 06.30 S Long 153.30 W
O.C. 153.30 W

Towards New Zealand Outward Ship Station 1844

Thursday 14th Nov

All these 24 hours day light - air from the
N.E. and north Steady South by Lat 7.10 S

Long 153.45 O.C. 153.40

Friday 15th Nov

Came with light air from the North and
pleasant Steady South Lat 8.38 Long 152.20
O.C. 152.30 W

Saturday 16th

Light breeze from N.E. to N Middle and latter
thick & Rainy Steady South North by Lat 10.15
Long 152.55 W

Sunday 17th Nov

Wind from the N.W. Steady S.W. by
squally with Rain a. Courant Steady to the
East Lat 11.40 Long 154.00 W

Monday 18th Nov

Wind from N.E. to North and squally with
Rain Steady S.W. Lat 13.22 Long 155.08 W

Tuesday 19th Nov

Wind variable from S.E. to West and squally
with plenty of Rain Steady S.W. and N.E. by
Lat 14.50 Long 155.00 W

Wednesday 20th Nov

All these 24 hours wind from N.W. to N.E.
and plenty of Rain Steady S.W.

Lat 14.15 Long 154.45

Thursday 21st Nov 1844

Fresh breeze from the North and Cloudy at
2 P.M. Steady S.E. by latter part squally
by Lat 17.00 S Long 155.40 W

Friday 22nd

All these 24 hours wind from N.W. to N
Middle part heavy squally and a hurricane
of Rain at 10 P.M. took in Sails by 1/2 hour
the N.E. Janny Clark fed for mice to gain
and was badly hurt or 2. Sunk off for 20.00.00
