

Journal of H. Whale Voyage on board Ship

Sunday 19th January 1845

Strong winds from the N to NNE. Very
S.W. at 4 P.M. took in sail by head to the
windward pass - thick with rain. Strong wind
and heavy snow in P.M. (by bar. 24.5 - S
{ no signs of Wholly and Jan. Lang 18. 20. 8.
all most discouraged by General

Monday 20th January 1845.

Waves with fresh winds from the N.E. heavy
in N.E. at 3 P.M. started off South at 4 P.M.
The wind hauled to the S.W. in a squall ahead of
the S.E. both part fine breeze from the S and
Breeze over mountain from the N. at 3/30
Log 13 1/2

Tuesday 21st January

All these 24 hours light air first part
 wind from the S.W. & heavy in both W.S.W.
 middle and latter part nearly E by a light
 air from the S.E. and foggy & squally
 Sat June 31. 20 by 172.00 E
 W. 21. 172.00

Wednesday 22nd

Very light air from the E. and thick no sign
of Wholy at 7 P.M. wore ship to the L.E. or 16 making 2
more with West or 14. 3 ships in sight - one
Cape Sander Bay West 4 or 35 miles dist or 18 made
Shoake ship Manette of Hove & Whaley

Los-Oly 45.62 H. long 30 mms

Thursday 23rd

First part then 26 knots light air from the N.E. and fair weather on 7 Pers. stood off at the L.E. on 7 Pers. wore ship. stood in on 12 Maria. Cape Gardney bore N. 57° 25' miles dist. by estimate heading off L.E. on 10th 45° 45' by 171° 20' M.

Friday 24th January

Five breeze from the N.E. and cloudy when
to the S.E. at 3 P.M. Saw a number of Right Whales
Low down at 5 to took one to the Ship at 7 Do have them
in wore Ship to the S.E. under Short Sail
Middle breeze latter part Storey Gale from
E.N.E. and Rain at night. Calmed Boiling
To Endy heavy S.E. under Close Reefed main
topsails and foresail imployed Boily
 Lat by Gal 41.35 Long 171.25

Saturday 23rd January 1845.

All these 24 hours strong gale just from
Wind N.E. and heavy headed to the S.E.
As a ship would haulen to the West-headen
to the NW. have to put out the work or so say
I kept for Fair Spit in intent it to
Repair for by 45. 35 Long 171. 30 E.

Sunday 21st January

Came with strong gale from the N.W.
 and very rough & headwinds N.W.
 Middle part rather more moderate
 but Jones sail and began to back last part
 very light air and often calm
 Cape Henry in light very S.W. direction
 in light in show to every influence
 Back. Lat 06 45 39 Long 171 18 E.

Monday 27th January

These 24 boats every boat has a crew of 12
with fair weather at 8 A.M. took a whale boat
ship and cut him in so every Cape Sander
SW 35 miles a plenty of Whales in sight
