

Remarks On Board Ship Stephanie of
Saturday Oct 21st 1854

Commences with light breezes from the S. S. E. Steering
by the wind to the S. W. crew employed in Sundry jobs
Middle part light breezes from E. S. E. Steering South
Latter part much the same crew employed in
Ship's Duty and so ends there 24 hours Lat 35.40 S
Theodore J. Haskell off Duty Lt Long 22.45 W

Sunday the 22nd
Commences with fine breezes from the Eastward
Steering South with cloudy weather. Middle part
the hauling gradually to the Northward with rain at
8 P.M. took in the top gallant sails and fly jib and
Double reefed the topsails. Latter part more moderate
shook the reefs out of the topsails and set the main
top gallantsail and so ends

Monday the 23rd

Commences with Strong breezes from the N. E.
Steering S. under topsails cloudy rainy weather
Middle part much the same Latter part the wind
hauled round to the Westward with thick fog
Steering by the wind to the South Lat 35.50 S
and so ends there 24 hours Long 21.25 W

Tuesday the 24th
Commences with moderate breezes from the Westward
with foggy weather Steering by the wind to the South

at 1 A.M. the fog lit up Saw a right Whale ahead
the fog shut down again at 2 the fog lit up
again raised the whale ahead 42 mile Dist lowered
the boats but the fog shut in again the boats
came on board again Saw Nothing more of the
whale Middle part much the same. Latter
foggy weather the wind hauled round to the Eastward
Saw spouts but could not tell what they was
and so ends there 24 hours Lat 36.20 South

New Bedford Bound South

Wednesday Oct the 25th 1854

Commences with fresh breezes from the Eastward and
Northward with thick weather Steering by the wind
on Diferant tacks. Middle and Latter part Strong
breezes from the S. W. with thick and rainy weather
at 9 A.M. Saw a large Sperm Whale going to the
Northward and westward made Sail and stood by the
wind to the S. W. at past 9 tacked Ship and stood
by the to the Northward Saw the whale again
at 10 2 points on the Weather bow stood by the wind
on Diferant tacks but Saw Nothing more of the
Whale and so ends there 24 hours Lat 36.15 S
Theodore J. Haskell off Duty Long 20.55 W

Thursday the 26th

Commences with Strong breezes from N. W. Steering
by the wind to the N. N. E. Saw finbacks Middle
part much the at ran set took in Sail heading
to the North Latter part fresh breezes from the N. W.
at day light wore Ship set double reefed topsails
heading S. W. at 4 past 8 A.M. Steered South and
so ends there 24 hours Lat 35.48 S
Theodore J. Haskell off Duty Long at 20.24 W

Friday the 27th

Commences with fresh gales from the W. N. W.
Steering South at 4 P.M. took in Sail and luffed to the
wind on the Starboard tack heading S. W. by S. at 6
P.M. furled the fore Sail and close reefed the main top

sail Middle and Latter part more moderate at
day light set double reefed top sails and stood by the
wind to the S. W. at 4 past 10 off S. E. and so ends

Commences with Strong breezes from the N. W. with
A heavy swell from the Westward Steered N. E. saw fin-
backs and A great many Whale birds. Middle and latter
part fine breezes from the S. W. crew employed in
breaking out water and Flour and so ends there
24 hours
