

North off Sunday Island
Sunday March 16th 1857
Began with a calm and the C.W.
Thomson & Lewis in sight and we
whaled & a trying to get to the
North the middle part Calm and the
Latter part a light breeze from N.N.W.
and saw nothing Lat 27.32 S. Long 178.30

Monday March 17th
Began with a light breeze from the
North and at 1 P.M. saw breches to
windward a great distance of & took
them to be sperm whales at 3 saw
a sperm whale & killed of on the weather
bow. Lewis for him and did not see him
after at 8 took up the boats and
heading N. at 10 A.M. fast ship to the
N.E. at 4 past 8 saw whales and at
9 Lewis and at 10 struck one and
at sundown took him along side
so much. Lat 27.17 S. Long 179.00 W.

Tuesday March 18th
Began with fine weather at 1 P.M.
Came cutting at 4 past 10 finished
& the weather squally at 8 A.M. Com-
bined and the latter part squally
& spoke the C.W. Morgan of N.B.
so much. Lat 27.30 S. Long 179.40 W.

Wednesday March 19th
Began with squally weather and
the wind from the North and a
boiling at 2 P.M. the wind held
to the South and heading to the
Eastward the middle part rainy and
cold all hour at 11 A.M. spoke the
Bark Edw. Perry of London &
Mentioned from London 25 days & from
C. W. Morgan. So then 24
hours began with rainy weather
Lat 27.05 S. Long 179.35 W.

North off Sunday Island
Thursday March 20th 1857
Began with a light air from the
North & squalls of rain & a boiling
at 11 P.M. finished and the latter
part a boisterous Cal. so much that
24 hours Lat 26.40 S. Long 179.07 W.

Friday March 21st
Began with light airs and squalls
and wind from all points of the
Compass the latter part a storm
down Cal. so much & heading round
round and ship C.W. Morgan in
sight. Lat 25.53 S. Long 179.25 W.

Saturday March 22nd
Began with a light air from the
N.E. and fair weather and a storm
down at 5 P.M. finished the middle
part fair latter part heavy rain & the
wind from E. & E. and squally
so much. Lat by the 28.00 S. Long 179.50 W.

Sunday March 23rd
Began with a fresh breeze from E.
& raining and heading S.E. &
and our ship in sight to windward
the middle & latter part squally and a
great deal of rain Lat 28.34 S. Long 179.10 W.

Monday March 24th
Began with a strong breeze from E. & E.
& very squally and one ship to windward
and a bark past steering S.W. at 1
P.M. took in sail heading E. & E. the
middle and latter part a strong
breeze from the Eastward and then rain
to the S.E. and saw nothing of
note Lat 28.21 S. Long 179.05 W.
