

Thursday June 4 - 1914
 Good S.W. breeze with thick cloudy
 weather. Saw several Steamers
 W. Spanner & J. Martin still off duty
 sick Pompe and light attended to
 So ended this day Lat $34^{\circ}18' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}11' W$

Friday June 5
 Moderate S.W. breeze. Saw several
 Coasting Schrs. Pompe & light
 attended to So ended this day
 Lat $33^{\circ}40' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}00' W$

Sat June 6 - 14
 Struck the northern edge of the
 Gulf Stream at 5 A.M. with a
 strong S.E. breeze. At 8 A.M. wind
 veered to N.E. and blew hard for
 a few hours and then gradually
 moderated to a calm
 Pompe and light attended to
 So ended this day Lat $36^{\circ}20' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}34' W$

Sat June 6 - 1914
 Light N.E. breeze with clear pleasant
 weather. Saw several Schooners & Steamers
 Sperm whales were raised at 10 45 A.M.
 by Mr. Loper. The whales were going quick
 to the Southward. Lowered 3 boats
 Third mate caught one. No chance for
 any more. Finished cutting in at 4 30 P.M.
 Lat $36^{\circ}14' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}11' W$

Sunday June 7
 Calm all day. Stowed down 12 bbls
 of oil Pompe and light attended
 to So ended this day Lat $36^{\circ}20' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}14' W$

Monday June 8 - 1914
 Fresh S.W. breeze. Saw plenty of
 Whale Scaps but no whales.
 Vessel Cruising Pompe and light
 attended to So ended this day
 Lat $37^{\circ}05' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}18' W$

Tuesday June 9
 Moderate N.E. Gale with thick
 fog in the morning with
 Heavy Thunder storm at
 8 P.M. So ended this day
 Lat $36^{\circ}42' N$
 Long $74^{\circ}12' W$
