

Sat July 18 - 1914
 Begins with a heavy thunder storm
 Wind S.W. Later Part Clear
 and pleasant Vessel Cruising
 Pumps and lights attended to
 So ends this day Lat $37^{\circ}30'$ N
 Long $73^{\circ}37'$ W

Sunday July 19 - 14
 Beautiful Weather. Nice N.W.
 breeze. Very clear. 5 men at
 mast heads and never saw
 a spout. (Hard tick) Lat $37^{\circ}00'$ N
 Long $74^{\circ}10'$ W

Monday July 20 - 1914
 Sperm whales raised at 5 A.M.
 Lowered 3 boats. L.B. & W.B. each
 caught one. Moderate N.E. breeze
 with clear pleasant weather. 4
 Whaling Schooners in sight all boiling
 Lat $36^{\circ}30'$ N
 Long $74^{\circ}05'$ W

Tuesday July 21 - 1914
 Finished boiling at 6 A.M. Lone sperm
 whale raised at 7 A.M. Lowered
 3 boats at once. W Boat went
 from one end of the whale to the
 other. (Nothing happened) Boats pulled
 8 hours steady and never got
 a cent.
 No Lat. No Long. No whale

Wed July 22 - 1914
 Calm all day. Saw many Grampus
 Pumps and lights attended to
 So ends this day No obs

Thursday July 23
 Sperm whales were raised by S. Chr
 Ellen A. Swift. Lowered our boats at
 once and made with said S. Chr.
 Swift's 3rd mate struck whale.
 Took the whale along side of Swift.
 Towners' two boats went on board the
 Swift to help cut in whale. After the
 head was cut off the Towners' boat
 took the body of the whale and started
 to tow it along side of the S. Chr. Towners.
 The whale began to sink and the
 boat had to let go of the line to
 save the boat. The body of the whale
 was lost. So ends this day
 Lat Nil
 Long

Friday July 24
 Calm all day. S. Chr. Ellen A. Swift
 in sight. No Whales seen.
 Pumps and lights attended to
 All well So ends this day
 Lat $37^{\circ}23'$ N
 Long $73^{\circ}49'$ W
