Remarks on Board Barque Tamarlane N.B.
September

Tuesday 4th

First part of this day begins with a strong breeze from the N.W. ship under double reef staysails mainsail & jib in at daylight and the mainsail & jib out staysails & then steered N.W. & at 7 P.M. steered N.E. and at 5 P.M. saw land & point aft the starboard beam 15-20 miles of a heavy sea on & squally got out Molanus molanus nothing in sight the men employed in ship duty

Wednesday 5th

This day commences with a gale from the N.W. ship on distance tacks & working at the N.W. sometimes all sails & some times double reef say squally thick & rain at 11 P.M. saw land more 15 miles miles of the starboard beam saw one bow head & going to the N.W. the say had sea on nothing but a gale all the time the men employed in ship duty No Vh To Day

Thursday 6th

First part of this day begins with a moderate gale from the N.W. ship under double reef staysails mainsail & jib at 6 P.M. took in the mainsail & jib & more reef the staysails & set the four & aft sails middle & last part a heavy gale from the N.W. ship heading to land & at 5 P.M. rounded 22° in green water & had sea on clear weather but on Rembrandt Bower on the ground L. H. 0.66 58 Long. 168.50
